Some of the employes of the cempany had gone to the States during the last year, lured by the promise of higher wages, and letters have been received from some, asking if their old places were open if they should return. The slowing down of industry in the States was shown by the return of many Canadians to their old homes.

'Referring to intermittent labor, due to lack of demand for products, Mr. Simms said this problem was giving the executive much serious thought and they were trying to overcome the difficulty so far as the Simms plant was concerned. Co-operation, quicker production, a reduction in cost and a better quality of goods would help to solve this problem, and he hoped to have this condition realized in their plant.

Mr. Simms said that when he read the advice of the Montreal Gazette to the people down here to forget mari-time rights and work out their own destiny, he was at first angry, but in the end felt that after all the Gazette was right. We must look more to ourselves and less to Ottawa. He had ourselves and less to Ottawa. He had unbounded faith in these provinces and, having been in many parts of the globe, had yet to find a more desirable place in which to live. We should cease exporting brains and devote them to the upbuilding of our own province. It had been clearly shown in the case of their own industry and others that maritime brains and skill could meet competition anywhere, and our people should not only have faith in themselves but prove it in their works.

A Tribute From Winnipeg John Drewe, of Winnipeg, represents the house which last year handled more Simms products than any other house in the west. Mr. Drewe dis-cussed the Simms industry from the tustomers' viewpoint. He said something like a dozen years ago his house was looking for a satisfactory line of brushes. They were handling a U.
