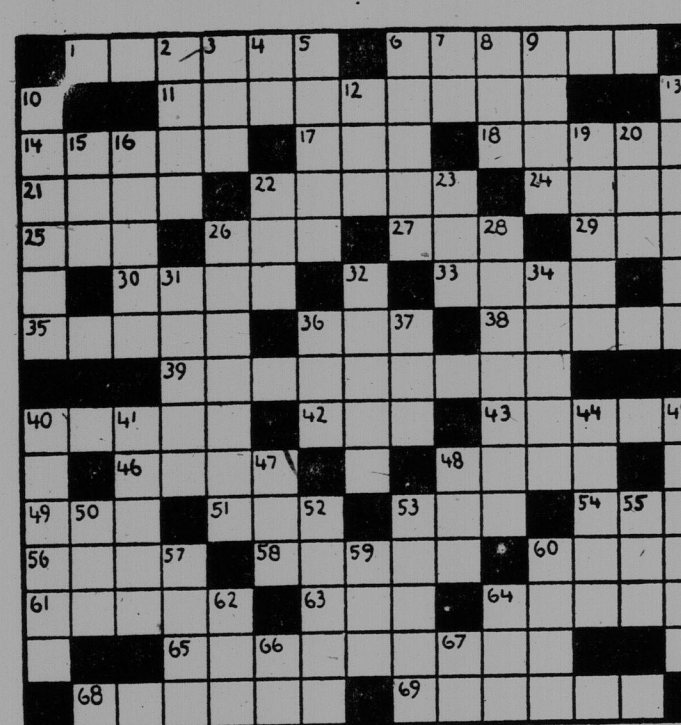
Chest sore? MAY ACCEPT CALL This Is Solution of Saturday's Puzzle

Rev. Dr. David Hutchinson will in all probability have a definite announcement to make sometime this week with regard to the call which he received six weeks ago to become the pastor of the Baptist church at Brockville, Ont. His recent illness and his sorrow in the death of his wife have made Dr. Hutchinson feel that he would like to accept the pastorate of a smaller church than his present charge, Main street Baptist church, which larger responsibility has become too severe a tax upon his strength. He is seriously considering the acceptance of the call to Brockville, which presents an opportunity for service that would be acceptable to any Baptist pastor. The Brockville pastorate in the past has been held by several of the outstanding preachers of the denomination, among them Rev. Dr. Gilmour, of McMaster University, and Dr. Symonds, of Massachusetts, and Rev. Dr. W. W. Wheaton, now of Richmond, Vt.

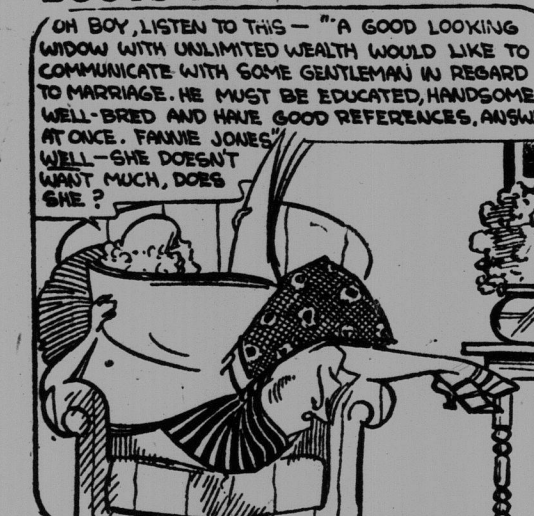

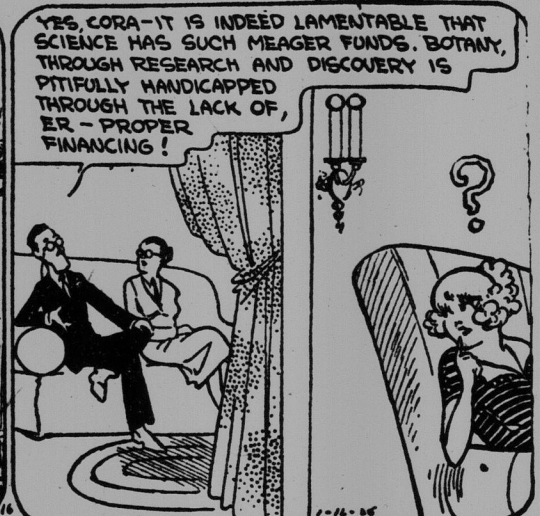

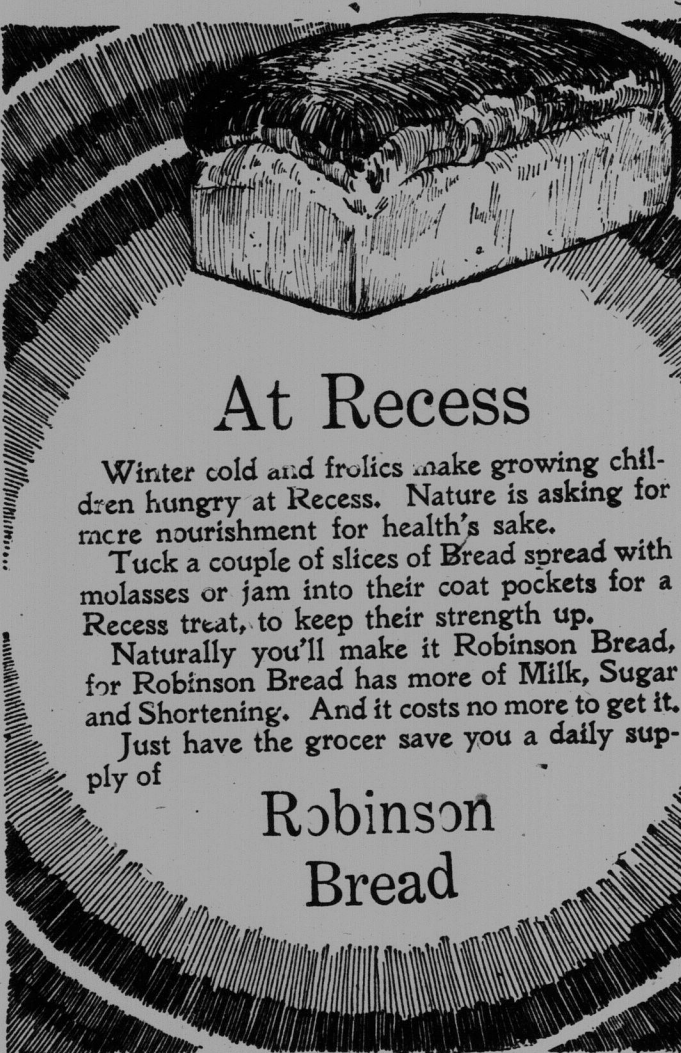
