N. S. LAND CASE IS IN LOCAL COURTS

A. J. Sollows Brings Suit Against H. W. Schofield for \$11,000.

Claiming about \$11,000 for commissions in connection with the purchase of lands in Digby county, Nova Scotia, or for the loss of opportunity to earn these commissions, A. J. Sollows of Kings county has brought suit in the Supreme Court against Harry W. Schofield of St. John and the New France Lumber Co. of Weymouth, N. S. The case came before Mr. Justice J. H. Barry in chambers this morning and the entire session was taken up with the direct examination of the plaintiff, which was to be continued this afternoon. Mr. Sollows told of negotiating for the purchase of the land in question which was first valued at \$40,000 and which later was offered for sale at \$225,000.

Belyea and Gilbert appear for the plaintiff and Harrison and Anglin for the defendants.

DR. M. A. MORRIS DIES IN BOSTON

News of the death of Dr. M. A. Morris of Boston, which occurred yesterday has been received by his sons, the Misses Morris of Southwood, Lancaster. SOVIETS ARE ON WAY TO ST. JOHN

Delegation on Mission are Among Passengers on S. S. Montclare.

The Canadian Pacific steamship Montclare, which is en route here from Liverpool and Glasgow, is bringing a record passenger list for the season. She has a total of 1,411 passengers, 269 cabin and 1,142 third class. The cabin passengers comprise 238 adults, 29 children and four infants, and the third class comprise 985 adults, 141 children and 15 infants. She is due next Saturday or Sunday.

It is expected that a delegation representing the Soviet Government in Russia will arrive in the Montclare on a mission to Canada. What the mission is not divulged. They were expected two weeks ago, but for some reason did not arrive.

URGES USING THE PORTS OF CANADA

Board of Trade Here Writes Minister on Cattle Question.

The Board of Trade is writing to Hon. W. R. Matherwell, Minister of Agriculture, urging a greater use of Canadian ports for cattle shipments to the United Kingdom. In connection with the protest against the allowing in of Canadian cattle on account, it is said, of there being danger of hoof and mouth disease, the board points out that this may possibly arise from a misconception as to where the cattle are really from. The minister's attention is called to the fact that Canadian grain shipped from foreign ports has lost its identity and the whole business has suffered on that account, and the possibility is that Canadian cattle shipped from foreign ports are being mistaken for those coming from other countries where this disease is prevalent.

The minister is asked to use his best efforts to have cattle shipped through Canadian ports, and it is pointed out that the Government have at St. John some of the best cattle-shipping facilities in the country, located at Government piers and revenues from which goes direct to the Government.

FIVE ESCAPE; THREE RETAKEN

Five boys escaped from the Boys' Industrial Home in East St. John yesterday. William Cavell, Lewis Malce, Arthur Owens, Edward Cunningham and John Jones. The first two made their escape yesterday morning and are still at large, but the last three got away last night but were recaptured soon after and were taken back to the institution. The boys still at large are 17 years of age, both of dark complexion and are wearing khaki clothes.

"If our folks hears that, when rents in St. John is goin' up," said Hiram, "they'll forget about the Loyalsists an' want to go across the line."

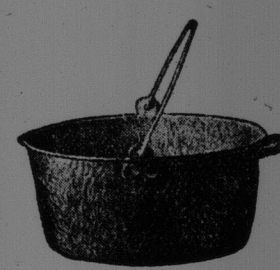

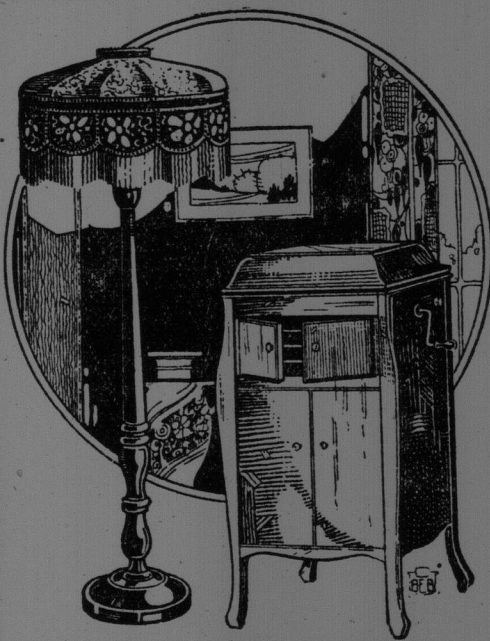
