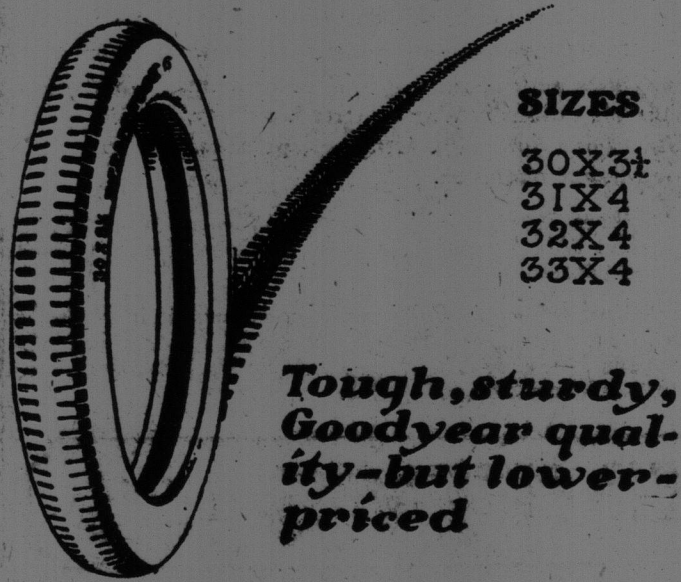


GOOD YEAR WINGFOOT CORD TIRE WITH THE CROSS-RIB TREAD

England to Follow U. S. Methods In Control of Cancer

New York, June 20.—At the request of the Ministry of Health, London, England, Dr. George A. Soper, Managing Director of the American Society for the Control of Cancer, has forwarded to the Ministry data concerning the Society's cancer control work here, to be used in the English drive against the disease.

Recently a number of British physicians, surgeons and others prominent in the civic life of the Empire, alarmed by the rapid increase in the mortality from cancer, organized with the aid of the Ministry of Health what is to be known as the British Empire Cancer Campaign. They were spurred to this by the realization that in 1921 one in every seven deaths of persons over 30 years of age in England and Wales was caused by cancer.

As long ago as September 1922, Dr. James E. Adams, of London, writing in the Lancet called attention to the campaign against cancer in America, saying: "There they have a powerful society for the control of cancer and much work is being done by it to enlighten the public as to its early signs and dangers of delay. The power of the press and the pulpit are both being utilized in this good cause, and I believe I am right in saying that this society organizes 'cancer weeks' from time to time. I believe with our present lack of precise knowledge it is the most satisfactory road to success and treatment."

In writing on behalf of the Ministry of Health, Dr. A. B. Smallman, Secretary, told of the inception of the English campaign, and said he wrote to the Society as an organization representing one of the earliest established, most extensive and best known of its kind. He desired to know the methods employed by the Society, the results obtained, and whether the broadcasting of information had induced patients to seek early advice and treatment. In a subsequent letter he asked for any statistics available which might show that the disease, if treated by operation at an early stage, is curable in a proportion of cases.

The society has replied to the last question through Dr. Francis Carter Wood, Director of Cancer Research at Columbia University. In his letter Dr. Wood said:

"Care must always be taken in mak-

ing propaganda statements to specify the type of cancer. For example, it is perfectly proper to say that early cancer of the lip can be cured in 90 per cent. of the cases; that early cancer of the skin in nearly 100 per cent., and early cancer of the breast in 80 per cent. A number of clinics have reported as high as 20 per cent. cures of cancer of the stomach."

Information received from London shows that the campaign there will be conducted along the lines adopted by the American Society for the Control of Cancer here. They are already in use in several other countries, particularly in France, where the American methods have been closely followed. Germany is also conducting an educational campaign along the same lines.

Among those interested in the English movement are Sir Thomas Horger, who was called in by Premier Bonar Law for a consultation shortly before the Prime Minister resigned; J. P.

ONION SETS START FIRE AT SCENE OF WEDDING

Policeman Rescues Woman at Blaze Caused by Combination of Sun, Tissue Paper and Oil.

Rockville Centre, L. I., June 21.—Mrs. Joseph Gelesino was carried from a sick bed in her apartment on the first floor of the Hicks & Watts Company, Inc., building at Merrick Road and Lincoln Avenue, when a fire caused by onion sets in a display window broke out in the hardware store below.

Mrs. Gelesino has been ill for nearly a year and has been confined to bed for ten months. She was carried from the smoke-filled building by Patrolman Harold Reifenberg to the home of Glen Pettit across the street. The excitement brought on a relapse, and it was said by a physician that her condition is serious.

A wedding ceremony was held in the Gelesino apartment at the bedside of the sick woman an hour before the fire. The guests had assembled to witness the marriage of Miss Mildred Langdon, Mrs. Gelesino's daughter by her first husband, to Raymond Kamenaker of Rockville Centre. Mr. and Mrs. Gelesino and the bride and bridegroom and twenty-one guests were in the apartment at the time of the fire, which was quickly extinguished.

James Hicks, a member of the Bureau Hook and Ladder Company, was cut and injured on the head when a large plate glass window fell on him. According to the firemen, the sun beating down upon a quantity of onion seeds in the hardware store window caused them to bake, and the heat ignited some display tissue paper, which in turn communicated with a display of oil and paint.

TEN BEACH CENSORS BAN ONE-PIECE BATHING SUITS

Atlantic City, N. J., June 21.—One-piece bathing suits and bare legs among women bathers are under the ban along the beach.
