Walter Burd, of Toronto, Speaks of Plan and Aims of This Organization of Men in Church of England.

Walter Burd of Toronto, general secretary of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in Canada, is in the city on business connected with that society. In the course of an interview Mr. Burd explained the objects and organization of the Society. It is the men's organization of the Church of England, and its one put rose is the training of men and boys to prvice. It is essentially not a social organization but a working body. In the Senior Brotherhood, which includes men from eighteen up, the foundation of all work is prayer, and the ultimate aim is to win the man or boy for Christ. Each member of the chapter aims to bring one man or boys to the confirmation classes and corporate communion.

Each chapter assists in securing candidates for the ministry and in organizing men's Bible classes and Sunday schools. They also assist the church wardens in welcoming strangers at the church door and assist the pastor in visiting. Hospital, prison and hotel work is also accomplished by this chapter. Open-air church services are often held, to reach those who will not attend church indoors. Club rooms are established by the chapter to keep the young men of the parish off the streets at night. night.



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

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
