GREECE SAYS SHE CANNOT ACCEPT TREATY REVISION

Athens, March 2.—Greece cannot ac-
cept revision of the treaty of Sevres,
which she considers represents the mini-
mum compensation for her sacrifices in
the war and efforts to establish peace
in the Near East.

This was the substance of a resolution
adopted by the national assembly last
night, which will be telegraphed to the
Greek delegation in London for presen-
tation to the Allies.

CANADA'S DEBT GREW IN YEAR

\$674,337,531

Finance Report for 12 Months to March 31, 1920

National Progressives to Support Amendment of Hon. Mackenzie King in the Commons—Some Legislation.

Ottawa, March 2.—(Canadian Press).—In the house, yesterday, Sir Henry Drayton tabled the report of the deputy minister of finance on public accounts for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1920. The report showed a net debt of \$224,848,808.87 on March 31, 1920, an increase from \$1,964,853,618.62.

Referred to account of consolidated revenue fund for the year amounted to \$8,971,634.70, and expenditures on the same account to \$8,808,448,929.90, showing a surplus of \$163,185,764.80 in ordinary receipts over ordinary expenditures. In addition to ordinary expenditures special expenditures were made chargeable to consolidated revenue fund amounting to \$386,943,118.15.

The net debt increased by \$674,337,531.29 over the debt of \$1,964,853,618.62 of 1919. The increase was accounted for as follows: Special expenditures, \$386,943,118.15; capital expenditures, \$301,871,753.29; non-active assets, \$283,805,005.17.

For King Amendment.

In the House of Commons first reading was given to an act to define "Canadian national," that is, any British subject ordinarily residing in Canada.

Dr. Michael Clark of Red Deer, declared that the National Progressives moved adjournment, but the house would support the Mackenzie King amendment, asserting that confidence in the government.

Hon. Hugh Guthrie contended that the fiscal policy of 1919 Liberal platform was not the policy followed when Liberal were in power. Mr. King, he said, represented a remnant only of the Liberal party.

After Thomas Vlen (Leithbridge) had concluded, there was no one ready to go on. Ernest Lapointe (Quebec East) moved adjournment, but the house leader, C. J. Doherty objected, and Pius Mehaud (Victoria, N. B.) filled the breach. Fred Johnson (East Mount) and A. B. Copp were the other speakers.

The adjournment was moved by Mr. Copp at 11:30 p.m.

In the senate, notice of a bill was given by Sir James Loughheed to give effect to an agreement reached by the dominion, Ontario and Manitoba authorities with regard to control of the Lake of the Woods. Tributes were paid by the party leaders to senators who had died during the recess.

MIX-UP OVER LIQUOR ACT IN PROVINCE OF B. C.

Private Importation May Yet Be Permitted

Attorney-General Farris Criticizes Federal Government in the Matter—Says It Looks Like Serious Blow at Administration of Act.

Victoria, B. C., March 2.—(Canadian Press).—The British Columbia government is not likely to have the sole right of importation of liquor. This was made clear to the house yesterday by Hon. J. W. Deb, Farris, attorney general, when he read correspondence between the minister of justice in Ottawa and Premier Oliver.

The federal minister of justice referred to the federal act of 1916, which was amended in 1917 as meeting the desire of British Columbia in regard to the prevention of the importation of liquor by persons other than the government. Mr. Farris explained, however, that this act had not been effective.

"If this is as far as Ottawa is going in helping the government of British Columbia, I think they are falling in their obligations," said Mr. Farris. "We cannot constitutionally prohibit the importation of liquor into this province, and I doubt if we can prohibit the use of liquor, which is naturally incidental to the right to import."

"Unless in this connection we secure the co-operation of the federal authorities, then a serious blow has been struck by the dominion authorities to the proper administration of this act."
