CALL FOR TENDERS FOR NEW SCHOOL IN NORTH END

The buildings committee of the school board at an important meeting yesterday afternoon made arrangements to call for tenders for the new school building in Newman street and for a considerable amount of repairs that will be undertaken during the holidays. M. Coll, the chairman of the committee, presided, and the other trustees present were Mrs. R. O'Brien, Thomas Nagle, J. H. Green, E. R. W. Ingraham, A. A. McElroy, J. D. P. Lewis, Dr. A. F. Emery, Dr. H. S. Bridges, superintendent of schools, and A. Gordon Leavitt, secretary.

Mr. Neil Brodie, the architect, submitted plans for the Newman street school and for the school which it is proposed to build in Carleton. The two school buildings, according to the plan submitted, will be about the same in the accommodation provided. It was decided to call for tenders for the Newman street school and Monday, July 11, is fixed as the date when tenders will close.

The committee authorized the payment of \$3,425.27 to H. R. Weatherhead for tenders for the completion of a plumbing work for the installation of a new heating system. Less than \$100 was for the new heating system, as described in plans drawn by F. H. Brodie, has been installed up to present.

Joseph Golding was appointed school painter, succeeding the late Mr. Roby who died while in the employ of school board.

CHILD FATALLY BURNS ANOTHER

Chatham, June 22.—A sad fatality occurred at Blackville on Monday, when the year-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Judson Underhill was burned to death. While the mother was in another part of the house a two-year-old brother took a stick of burning wood out of the stove in the kitchen and ignited the child's clothing, and before the mother heard the cries of the younger child every stitch was burned off its body and it died in a few minutes after suffering intense agony.

EXONERATE THREE OF GIRL'S DEATH

Montreal, June 22.—Judge Leet, sitting in chambers this afternoon, discharged Dennis O'Sullivan, Thomas Lyng and John Grace, civil employees, of responsibility in connection with the death of Lilly Manning, the eight-year-old girl who fell down an open manhole on March 10 last.

All three men were charged with manslaughter.

SIR J. F. FRASER PREDICTS PEACE IN IRELAND SOON

Rochester, N.Y., June 22.—Sir John Fraser, F.R.G.S., speaking last night at Webster, near here, predicted that "something would happen on Thursday to end the rioting and rebellion in Ireland."

"Watch the date, Thursday," he urged, "and see if I am not right. I know what I am talking about. There will be peace in Ireland this week."

Gomper's Wins on Irish Issue.

Denver, Colo., June 22.—Sinn Féin sympathizers supporting a resolution calling for a boycott against British goods were overwhelmingly defeated today in an attempt to have the convention overthrown a ruling made by President Gomper's, which prevented reconsideration of their proposal.

The convention then disposed of the Irish question by adopting a mild resolution expressing sympathy for the Irish Nationalist cause. They also unanimously adopted a resolution urging modification of the Volstead Act to permit of the manufacture and sale of beer.

WILL TRY TO FLAVOR OCEAN WITH SPIRITS

\$500,000 Worth Will Be Empty in Sea Off Sandy Hook.

New York, June 23.—The district Attorney's office in New York county has begun proceedings to have the liquor in the name of the State of New York to seize liquor worth \$500,000,000 at bootleggers' prices.

After the seizure the liquor probably will be towed in garbage scows to a point off Sandy Hook, where the world's greatest cocktail will be concocted. The whole \$500,000,000 will be mixed in one colossal drink or whether it will be doled out to the ocean at the rate of a few thousand barrels a day is to be settled later.

The thousands of barrels of liquor if dumped all at once beyond the three-mile limit will not be enough to flavor the surface at the beach. It may, however, perfume the breezes for a few miles.

BRITAIN'S POLICIES TOLD TO PREMIERS

London, June 22.—A comprehensive but highly confidential review of the principles which have guided British foreign policy since the end of the war, with a detailed outline of the results of their application, were today given to the conference of prime ministers by Lord Curzon, secretary for foreign affairs.

Owing to the fact that questions of delicate international significance had to be touched upon, the conference agreed that the address should not be published. All that can be said, therefore, is that the foreign secretary took the conference completely into his confidence, laying all the cards upon the table, and at the same time inviting the delegates to interrogate him respecting each and every point upon which they might desire fuller information.

So far as could be ascertained tonight the statement is regarded as satisfactory by the representatives of the dominions.

It is pointed out, however, that a mere explanation of British foreign policy to the dominions is far from meaning that they have a voice or influence in the direction or execution of that policy. Lord Curzon's address, indeed, is regarded as emphasizing the difficulty of giving practical effect to the claim of the dominions for a voice in foreign affairs.

The foreign secretary was not asking advice or direction; he was simply outlining the principles and policies which have been adopted on the volition of the British government alone—explaining something that had already been done.

The one thing yesterday's sitting made clear was that a constitutional conference would not be held next year.

Premier Massey urged strongly against it, on the grounds that he was faced next year with general elections; Premier Hughes, as already noted, is strongly against a conference being held at all, while Premier McKeighen, who is also confronted with an election next year, will urge delay.

When the conference is held, Ottawa is not unlikely to be chosen for the meeting.
