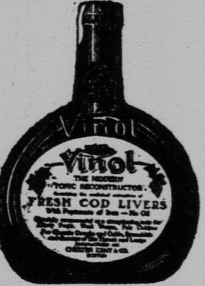

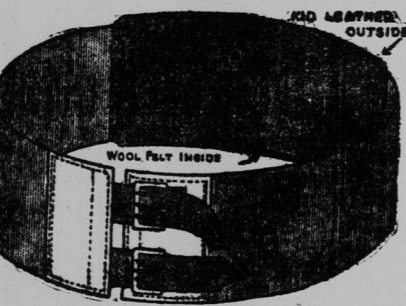

FATHER WAS IN A COLLAPSE

Scene at Trial of Braman This Morning

STEP-MOTHER SOBBING

Comment on Absence of Officials - One New Witness and the Crown Cloes its Case - Defence This Afternoon

The decorous proceedings in the trial of John H. Braman on the charge of murdering Frank E. O'Leary, were interrupted this morning when it became necessary to remove from the court-room the accused's father and step-mother, the latter crying loudly as she went and shrieking: "My boy! My boy! The poor boy!"

The father, who is just out of the hospital, is apparently in a very weakened state. He sat for an hour or more through the trial, supported by his wife. He was becoming steadily weaker, and moaning considerably, and when about on the verge of collapse, the attorney-general suggested to the court that the man should be removed, as he was most carried out by two constables, and his wife left the court-room unwillingly and weeping bitterly.

His Honor then asked for the sheriff or deputy sheriff, but was told that neither was in court.

His Honor—"Will you take notice of that, Mr. Attorney, please?" Attorney-General—"Well Your Honor, I am surprised that he is not here."

During all this scene the prisoner sat almost motionless, and showed no signs of emotion. The first witness called this morning was Dr. W. W. White, who gave testimony as to O'Leary's condition, the operation and the causes of death. He was examined, cross-examined and examined on technical points, on which he gave expert testimony.

Dr. W. F. Roberts was then called and produced the bullet located in O'Leary's body at the post mortem examination. Dr. Frederick T. Dunlop also gave evidence of the post mortem examination he made.

O'Leary Smith, a gunsmith, a new witness, was then called, and when shown the revolver and bullet in evidence, said the revolver was a .38 calibre, and the bullet was a .38.

The deposition of O'Leary was then offered in evidence by the attorney-general. His Honor said that he was allowing it, on his own finding of the fact that the defendant had a full opportunity of cross-examining the deponent's physical condition he would have decided otherwise. He said this clearly to give the defendant the benefit of the objection raised.

The deposition, which has already been published, was the result of the jury. The chief statement of O'Leary in the deposition was that he had arrested Braman in connection with the Mowatt robbery, the Braman said: "If you arrest me, I'll shoot you, so help me God" and that he afterwards fired two revolver shots at him.

This closed the case for the crown, and Mr. Sweeney asked for an adjournment until 2:30 o'clock to enable him to call his witnesses for the defence. This was agreed to.

Sheriff Wilson, when asked regarding remarks made by Mr. Justice Crockett from the bench, said: "I do not recall that he could not be in two places at one time. He and Deputy Sheriff Clifford were out on another mission. The sheriff said that he had left constables in charge during his absence."

NEW PHASE OF PINK CASE

Interest is still keen in Fairville over the case of the "Pink Steer" and is being given the matter during the last two days during which Engineer Turnbull, acting for Pink, has been making a survey of all properties in that section of Main street from the C. P. R. crossing to Charles street.

It is reported that each lot on both sides of the street is being carefully measured, and the deeds will also be examined, to see if the figures correspond and also to prove, if possible, that sufficient width for a sidewalk is available without removing the precious steps.

The case before the court will be resumed this evening at seven o'clock, and judging by previous attendance, breathing space will be at a premium.

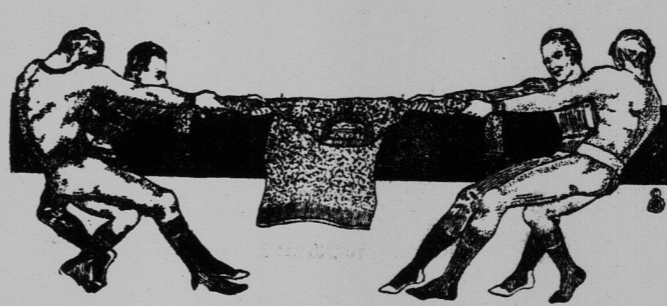

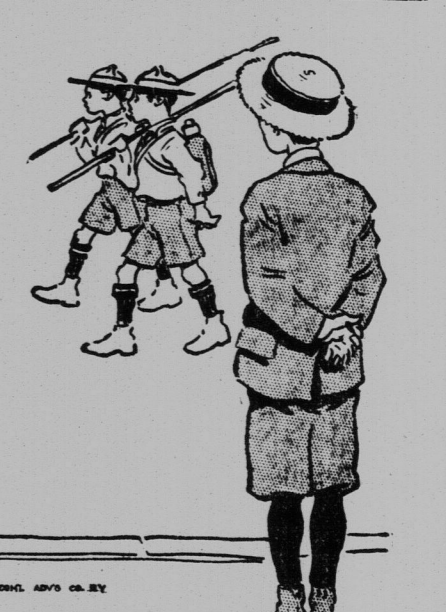
