a united and patriotic nation at their backs.

The opinion expressed almost universally is that under existing conditions Italy cannot remain neutral. The Socialist party is, as a matter of principle, opposed to war in the abstract, but it is recognized by them that the position of their country at the present moment is exceptionally critical and that her future largely depends on her present action. Should Italy abandon her neutrality tomorrow, the government will be supported by the Socialists as well as by all other parties. It is felt that when Italy first joined the Triple Alliance that the step was advisable, almost unavoidable, but that in the altered circumstances of today her interests lie with the Entente, The fact is recognized by all that should Italy remain neutral her eventual position would be an inevitable one. She would no longer have the friendship of Germany and Austria, which has been eliminated owing to her refusal to give them active assistance. She would, on the other hand, be unable to consider that she had augmented her friendship with France, and in any case could not expect to have her interests greatly considered on the readjustment of boundaries in the territories bordering on the Adriatic. 
