## COMMISSIONERS TAKE UP THE CITY BUILDING LAWS

May Be Re-Arrangement of Electrical Supervision — East St. John Men's Taxes

The city building laws and their enforcement was the subject of discussion at the meeting of the city commissioners at noon today. One of the matters which led to the discussion was the alleged carelessness in electrical installations in some instances. The need of more expert supervision was discussed, especially in view of the great increase in building operations in this city and the suggestion was made that a re-arrangement of the work might be effected under which it could be divided so as to secure better results without the employment of more officials. No action was taken, but it is probable that the discussion may lead to a change in the present situation.

A petition was presented to the commissioners today from residents in East St. John who are employed and taxed in the city. They protest against having to pay both city and county taxes and ask that steps be taken to exempt them from the double payment.

Mr. Condon of the I. C. R. engineering staff consulted with the commissioners today regarding the plans for drainage and sewerage in connection with the new playgrounds at Gilbert's Lane, which adjoin the railway property. He was informed that the sewerage will be carried off through the Marsh Creek without interfering with the railway line.
