## HAIG VISIT TO SAINT JOHN PLANNED

### FATHER LOCKARY BRINGS WORD ON RETURN TODAY

Coming to Province on Salmon Fishing Trip  
SAILS ON JULY 10  
Will Tour Ontario and Quebec Before Coming to New Brunswick

Earl Haig will likely visit Saint John next August. That is the news brought here today by Rev. F. M. Lockary of Woodstock, home from a pilgrimage to Rome.

While in London on the way home, Father Lockary, who is president of the G. W. V. A. in New Brunswick, had an interview with Capt. Simpson, secretary of the British Empire Service League, and hopes as a result that the British Field Marshal will meet a representative body of New Brunswickers in Saint John next August, when he comes to this province for salmon fishing on the Metepedia river.

### PRESENTS MATTER

Father Lockary took it upon himself as a war veteran representing New Brunswick to introduce the question of a visit from Earl Haig to the province. It was assumed, from what Secretary Captain Simpson said that Earl Haig was quite favorable to visiting here and it would require only some official invitation, no doubt, to have Saint John included in his route.

### GENERAL INVITATION

Therefore Father Lockary thinks that in addition to the Great Victoria official invitation, which would go forward in due form, Canadian Clubs, other patriotic bodies, and the government itself, might gracefully extend the same courteous invitation to the eminent soldier and thus assure his visit to this section. The ex-chaplain offers this as a suggestion.

### FISHING HERE AUG. 3

Earl Haig will leave Liverpool on Friday, July 10, and is expected to arrive in Quebec on the 18th. On July 19, he will pass through Montreal en route to Ottawa, where he will be here for four days. After that he is booked for Toronto, Hamilton, Winnipeg, Niagara Falls, the Big Horn, and then on Monday, August 8 he is to be on the Metepedia in New Brunswick for two days of fishing. His sailing date is scheduled for August 7.

### THINKS HE WILL COME

That Earl Haig's itinerary can in all probability be altered to allow of a visit to this city for a grand New Brunswick get-together seemed a sure thing to Rev. Father Lockary from impressions gathered during his interview with the Earl's league secretary.

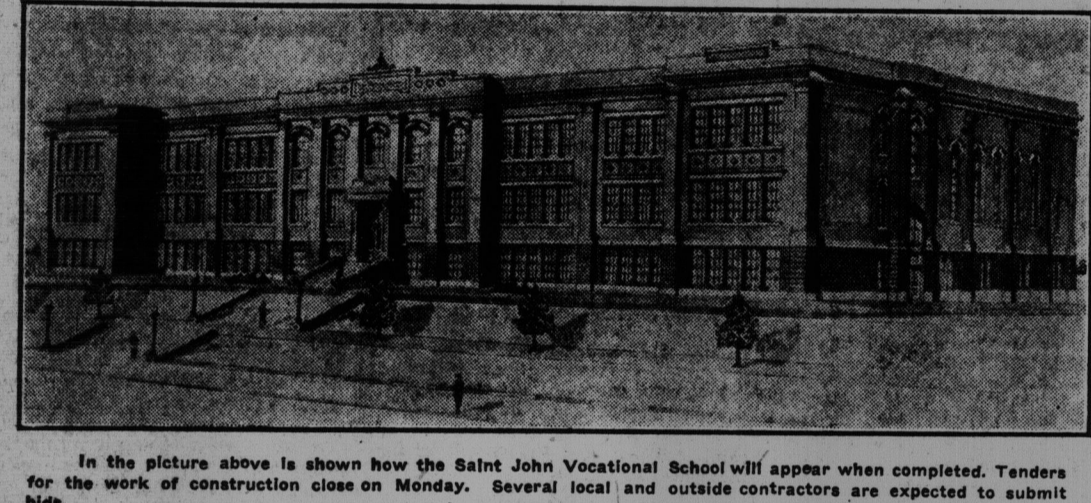
