**TEMPERANCE WORKERS MEET.**

The public temperance meeting held in the Prince Edward street church last evening was well attended. The chairman, Rev. H. E. Thomas, made reference to some general features of the campaign. He compared temperance conditions under the old license system and as it is now. Rev. O. P. Brown said that if the gospel were generally accepted there would be no need of prohibitions. Prohibition had accomplished much when it drove the open bar from the streets. Private importation was the great loophole and with that the liquor habit had been closed. Walter Brindle dwelt upon temperance as a habit. Given five years of prohibition, he said, we should have a province with the liquor habit unknown. Rev. W. D. Wilson compared the Quebec law with that of this province and spoke of the deplorable conditions which result up there. The chairman referred to the form of ballot to be used and directed all to vote Yes.

**DEATH ACCIDENTAL.**

The coroner's jury empaneled at St. Martin's to inquire into the cause of Halibut Brown, last evening brought in a verdict that he met death on September 16, about one and one-quarter miles north of the Bayview post office, from one of two rifle bullets, fired simultaneously from rifles in the hands of Graydon Gilchrist and John Holland. They also found that all parties were in the woods at an unlawful hour and without licenses. They also believe that apart from criminal carelessness the tragedy was purely accidental.

## LAYS \$24,000 LOSS TO "OCCULT" BROKER

**Court Says Men Who Per-suaded Professor to Invest Must Have Had Hypnotic Power.**

When William B. Lindsay, a retired professor of chemistry in Dickinson College, had concluded his statement in the Court of how he had lost his savings of a lifetime, amounting to \$24,000, in investments recommended by John H. Crabtree, an investment broker of 149 Broadway, Magistrate Simpson made this comment: "It would appear from the testimony that the defendant used hypnotic or occult power in obtaining the \$24,000 from this complainant."  
The court held Crabtree in bail of \$5,000 to await action by the Grand Jury on two charges of larceny.  
Lindsay, who has lived at 230 West Fifty-ninth street since he retired from the college in Scranton, Pa., said that he met Crabtree two years ago and was told by him that he controlled title to valuable coal properties in West Vir-

ginia, and was about to acquire control of other properties, with a view of uniting them in a syndicate to be known as the "Standard Pochontas Coal Company."

On the representation of Crabtree that he was in a position to sell the holdings at large profit Lindsay testified that he was induced to advance \$700 for one-half share of the net profits. Then he invested \$2,000, he said, when Crabtree informed him that he had an option on 9,000 acres of the Elliott-Spall property in Clay county, W. Va. After Lindsay's total investment had reached \$9,000 and Crabtree had mentioned another syndicate as the "Navy Standard Coal Company" New York bankers were referred to as acquiring an interest.  
"This was a year ago, and Crabtree told me a group of capitalists, including individuals connected with the Garfield National Bank and the Lincoln Trust Company, contemplated purchasing the property," Lindsay alleged. "Crabtree said he had employed H. F. Poir, a vice-president of the Garfield National Bank to investigate the property, and that he had gone to West Virginia."  
Lindsay submitted to the magistrate an order signed by Mr. Poir, at the bank, directing him to "please pay to W. B. Lindsay \$21,000 on or about July 11, 1921, from the special fund in your hands as per the terms of the agreement under which the fund was deposited, and this shall be your release for the amount of said fund above named."  
According to Lindsay, this was to be
