N. S. PREMIER GOES TO SYDNEY

Bangor Will Deport Him.
Bangor Commercial—Harold Murphy, a Canadian, who has been in the county jail here for several months in default of bonds on a \$5,000 civil action brought against him by Ernest Flewelling of St. John, N. B., was taken in charge by an immigration officer Sunday to be deported. Flewelling said that Murphy stole his wife's affections but at the close of the May term of the Superior Court Murphy was ordered discharged on the action. At the request of government officials, however, he was detained in jail to await deportation.

A Special Arrested.
Sydney, N. S., July 12.—Colonel Eric MacDonald, commissioner of the Provincial Police, said last night that he had found it necessary to arrest William MacKenzie, one of the special police force of about 125 men appointed by the town of Glace Bay for duty during the strike period. The arrest was made, he said, when the policeman was unable to give a satisfactory explanation of the source of his instructions to hold up motor cars in the Glace Bay area for the ostensible purpose of searching for liquor. There had been considerable stopping of motor cars during the day.
