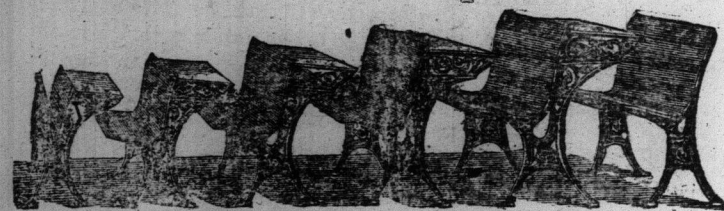

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Church Opening

The opening of the Seventh Day Adventist Church last Sunday was an occasion of real interest as was manifested by the large audience. The subject chosen was unique, entitled 'The Gospel Church.' The speaker, Elder Young of St. John's, traced the Church from Eden to the first Advent of Christ, entwining the gospel story with type and ceremonial through the Patriarchal and Levitical dispensations to the coming of Him who was the substance of all these shadows. From Rev. 6:1, under the symbol of a white horse and his rider, Mr. Young drew attention to the Church that was here launched known as the Apostolic Church which, though spirit-filled and terrible as an army with banners, soon experienced a sad change.

He quoted St. Paul's testimony of the working of the 'mystery of iniquity' in his day, and portrayed the apostasy that led to the awful scenes which darkened the pages of history. Reference was then made to the Reformation which came in wave after wave under such mighty men as Wycliffe, Luther, Zwingle, Knox and the Wesley's, due to the noble and dignified efforts of these men to restore faith in, and the study of the Holy Scriptures. But a note of warning was given by the speaker from 2 Tim. 3:13, 4:1-4, where St. Paul's inspired testimony declares that in the last days sin would be prevalent in the Church and the same tendency would prevail to depart from the Word of God to heed fables. The sermon was both instructive and edifying, closing with an appeal to greater diligence in the study of, and obedience to the Holy Scriptures.

At 7 p.m. another service was held in which a forcible sermon on Baptism was presented, the speaker citing many texts to prove that in God's plan baptism follows certain specific duties, viz—the individual must first be taught the gospel, that in hearing he must believe and repent. True repentance was shown to consist of sorrow for sin and a complete surrender to God. In this experience the former life of sin dies and the repentant believer becomes a new creature in Christ. Jesus, whose experience all being symbolized in the rite of baptism which was shown to signify death, burial and resurrection.

After the sermon three candidates were baptized in the church baptistry. The Adventists adhere strictly to the scriptural mode in accordance with which they immerse completely under the water, this act denoting a burial with Christ from which the candidate arises to walk with Him in the power of His life.

Adulterated Foods

A Canadian exchange says that the use of preservatives in foods intended for export from Canada will henceforth be allowed, provided their use is consistent with the country to which export is made. This means that if Newfoundland, for instance, has no adulteration of foods Act in force, that adulterated foods manufactured in Canada will be allowed to be exported to this country, even though Canada herself, in order to protect the health of her own people, will not permit their manufacture. The Government should take cognizance of this matter and enact laws to prevent this country becoming a dumping ground for adulterated foods.

The Men and the Hour

Pres. Wilson has scored another point, for he has succeeded in getting Congress to repeal the objectionable clause in the Panama Canal Bill, although not without great opposition. The matter now goes before the Senate where it will meet with still greater opposition; it is most probable, however, that the Senate will accept it, although the majority in its favour will not be a great one.

One of the latest newspaper correspondents to interview Villa, the rebel Mexican leader, tells us that Villa has no ambition to be President of Mexico for he had no education, and taught himself to read and write only two years ago. Neither was he a politician, but a fighting man, fighting to avenge Madero. The truth seems to be about Villa that he is satisfied as long as there is plunder and murder to be done. The future can look after itself.

The Home Rule Bill has passed its second reading for the third time in the life of the present British Parliament. The vote was 350 to 276, a majority of 80 for the measure. In 1912 the majority was 101, and 98 when it went through the Commons in 1913. The Government's normal majority is 98. Its reduction to 80 was mainly due to the fact that William O'Brien and his followers refrained from voting.

The order-in-council passed last December prohibiting until March 31 the entry of all classes of foreign labour into British Columbia has been extended by the Canadian Government for a period of six months.

Torreon, after a six-day battle, in which many hundreds of soldiers of the opposing forces were killed or wounded, was occupied by the rebel forces of Villa during the first week of April. Its streets were strewn with dead. The Constitutionalists are thus virtually given control of the whole of the Northern American States.

It has been announced that the Asquith Government have decided in favour of the dissolution of Parliament in June. The general election will thus take place in July.

The United States Government has signed a treaty with the Republic of Columbia by which it agrees to pay 25 million dollars in respect of the Panama Canal Zone.

'Stand on the doorstep until they receive you', were the orders from headquarters, given to some of the militant suffragists some few days ago in London, in arranging a series of visits to the Bishops of the Established Church.

In one instance the Bishop of Norwich having said he could not receive them, his secretary closed the door, switched off the electric light, and the women were left there formulating their arrangements by the light of the moon.

President Wilson certainly is having his hands full. That he has 'made good' signs becoming Presi-

dent of the Great Republic few will question. And in Mexican affairs he has doubtless acted with discretion. In refusing to recognize Huerta and in stepping in to bring about peace and order in Mexico, he has acted as a wise and strong ruler. If we interpret the Monroe Doctrine rightly, it was the duty of the United States to intervene in Mexico, not only in the interests of her own people but in those of other nations as well. What has happened is only what we have for months been expecting. When Huerta refused all offers of conciliation with Pres. Wilson and in the end captured and imprisoned her marines at Tampico, as well as refusing to salute the American flag when requested, then surely matters had reached a crisis. Orders were given to land the marines and bluejackets, and a few hours later, after a stubborn but short lived resistance, the stars and stripes floated over Vera Cruz. And now foes have become friends (?). Huerta and Villa, beforehand bitter enemies, have now united in defence of their country against the common enemy.

Cannot Accept the Invitation

Rev. Elijah C. French, of Fogo, has been unanimously invited to become Superintendent Minister of the Newtown Circuit. Mr. French is a preacher of exceptional ability, and is recognized as one of the finest pulpit-orators in this country. It is unfortunate for Newtown that Mr. French cannot see his way clear to accept, and Fogo Methodist Church must all the more appreciate the services of a man who refuses to leave his task until it is accomplished.

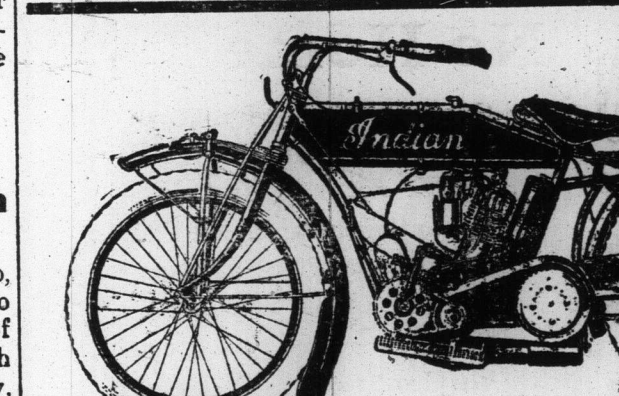
