The Globe's Views on the Charges Hurled at Them.

Toronto, Aug. 6.—The Globe says editorially, discussing the charges against the Yukon officials:

"The main charges against the Canadian officials also come originally from Seattle, where they are published as choice bits of sensational and abusive journalism. It is pleasant to Americans who have been made to pay royalties to hear Canadian officials denounced. These Canadian charges are clumsy, and they are built on the assumption that the Canadian regulations are similar to those on the American side of the line. From Seattle it is reported there was a stampede to Dominion Creek before it was opened by proclamation." When the challenge has been accepted the building of the yacht will be commenced." The Cowes representative of the Daily Mail says: "Yachtsmen feel that an alteration should be made in the conditions under which the race is sailed, and if that is possible they would be glad should the contest occur."
