## LOCAL NEWS

Eleven hundred harvest excursionists left Prince Edward Island last night for the west.

If the weather is unfavorable this evening the King Square band concert will be held tomorrow evening.

A belt found on Main street can be had on the owner's application at the North End police station.

George Saucor is reported by Policeman Hughes for allowing a horse to run at large on Sheffield street.

An excavation on Main street was left unexcavated this morning and the rear wheel of a heavily loaded lumber wagon dropped into the hole. It was extricated with some difficulty.

A number of persons were before the police court this morning charged by the Board of Health with leaving unclean premises. Since being reported the premises have been attended to, and they were excused.

All members of No. 3 Battery will meet at their own shed tonight for the purpose of organizing the detachment for Petrevana, and also to prepare for attendance at the funeral of Gunner F. Harvey tomorrow.

The summer residents of Renforth and Riverside enjoyed a moonlight sail last evening on the steamer Premier. The merry party went as far as Long Island. The occasion was most enjoyable. A nice sum was netted which will be given by the young ladies in charge in aid of the church at Riverside.

John DeAngles, the shoe-shine king, has secured the large store at Golden Ball corner (union and Sydney streets), and next week will open a new and elaborate shoe shine parlor. The new place will be under the management of Antonio DeMastreo, who for some years has been in Mr. DeAngles' employ.

Much sympathy will be felt for Mr. and Mrs. James B. Lyon, of 9 Lombard street, for the loss of their three year old boy, Stanley Gordon, who died at an early age this morning. Death was due to pleurisy, the child having been ill for three weeks.

The funeral will take place tomorrow morning when the remains will be taken to Westfield on the Sincennes for interment there.

No. 3 Company, 3rd Regt. C. A., will parade at the Main drill shed at two o'clock tomorrow for the purpose of attending the funeral of the late Gunner Harvey. Helmets and belts will be worn. Those men of this company who are going to Petrevana will meet at Fort Howe tomorrow evening at eight o'clock in plain clothes for the purpose of receiving equipment for the trip.

The report that the tug Dirigo, lying at Dunn's wharf in Castleton, sprang a leak Monday night and filled with water, was incorrect. The Dirigo was purposely filled with water by her owners, so that a small leak which had existed for several years might be discovered. Two three-inch holes were bored in the boat's bottom, one at the stern, the other forward. Through these the water was allowed to rush in until the boat was full. Then they were plugged so as to keep the water in. When the tide went out the boat lay on the mud and the old leak was easily located.

Services at the house prior to 1.45 at which time the body will be removed to Carmarthen street, Methodist Church, from where the funeral will be held at 2.30 o'clock.

**PLEADED GUILTY TO  
STEALING LIQUOR**

Young Man Fined for Drunkenness and is Remanded for Theft.

In the police court this morning two drunks were fined the usual amounts.

Wm. McNeil, a young man, pleaded guilty to being drunk on Coburg street early this morning. He is also held on suspicion of having broken into Nice's liquor store on King Square last night and having stolen a couple of bottles of liquor. He was fined \$4 for the drunkenness and remanded on the charge of theft.

Joseph McElhenney, a young man, was fined \$4 for drunkenness and remanded on the charge of wilfully breaking a window in Mrs. Doyle's house on Pond street. He threw a bottle through the window and struck a young woman with it, injuring her head.

Dr. Lewin informed the Star this morning that it was not the young man, run over by him on the Marsh Road, who died. It was his elder brother. The injured lad was brought around again in a few days.

## ACCUSED OF SETTING FIRE TO BUILDING

Serious Charges Against Colored Woman

Parents and Sister Testify Against Her—Her Mind May be Somewhat Unbalanced.

Mrs. Georganna Sneed, a colored woman, 38 years of age, pleaded not guilty to a rather serious charge in the police court this morning, that of setting fire to a house owned by her father, Phillip Bushfan, No. 1 Union Alley, and putting in danger the lives of eleven inmates. It is believed that the woman's mind is unbalanced, and she may be examined by a physician.

Phillip Bushfan, the father of the prisoner, gave evidence that he resided in Union Alley at the rear of the Opera House. He owns two houses there. Mrs. McAleer and Mr. Harrison live in No. 1 Union Alley, and witness in No. 3. His daughter does not live with her husband. Witness said that Mrs. Bushfan had made numerous threats against him, and about three weeks ago told him that some night when in bed he would find himself in a blaze.

The defendant resides in a house in the alley, and last night had an altercation with her sister, Mrs. McAleer. The defendant then said she would wait until all got to bed and things quiet, then she would do something. Witness was suspicious and kept watch. About 11.30 o'clock Mrs. Bushfan called witness and said "that girl has come from her house to ours." Witness got out of bed and saw a blaze in the house No. 1 Union Alley. At the same time he saw defendant run from the burning house back to her own house. Witness testified to No. 1 and found a gateway in front of the house saturated with paraffine oil, and all in a blaze. The residents of the alley were aroused and with water and earth witness, his son, with others, after some difficulty, put the fire out. Witness then hunted up a policeman and gave his daughter in charge.

When the police arrived defendant refused to open the door, so Policeman Thomas Sullivan gained an entrance through a window. The defendant refused to get on her clothes, and the police had to hold her while her sister fastened on her skirts.

In the house that was set on fire there is a family of five on the ground floor, and a family of six upstairs.

When asked if she had any questions to ask the witness, the defendant said she hadn't. She said she didn't remember making any attempt to burn the house, but had said she hoped that lightning would strike the house and burn it up.

Witness continued and said "his daughter had been very annoying and some weeks ago had assaulted her mother, and threw bricks into the house. He had done all that a father could do for his daughter, but finally had to put her out of his house."

Mrs. Mary Bushfan, mother of the prisoner, testified that some time ago her daughter had acted so badly that she had to be expelled from the house, and had made a threat that the whole alley would go up in smoke.

Last night witness said she heard her daughter making a threat, and some time later saw the defendant leave her house and go towards house No. 1. Then defendant ran back to her own house and at the same time the gate which is attached to the vestibule of No. 1 broke out in flames.

Mrs. Wm. McAleer, a sister of the defendant, gave evidence that she with her husband and four children resided at No. 1 Union Alley. Some time ago defendant was ejected from witness's house and as she took her clothes said, she said, that when the fire bells sounded she would have her clothes. Last night defendant used some abusive language to witness. Some few weeks ago defendant made a threat that she would burn her father's two houses. Once witness's little boy caught defendant stealing money and she said then she would poison the "bump."

George Hector, another resident of No. 1 Union Alley, gave evidence of hearing the defendant using abusive language to Mrs. McAleer. After he had retired he heard someone scream "fire" and he saw the gate on fire. He didn't see the defendant about at the time of the fire.

Frank McAleer and Mrs. Frank Bushfan also gave evidence of seeing the house on fire.

The prisoner was remanded until this afternoon when some witnesses will be heard.
