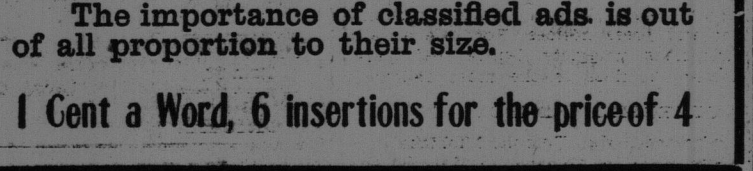

#### MANY WENT THROUGH ICE

BOSTON, March 28.—Breaking through the ice on the inland ponds, lakes and rivers of New England and the Maritime Provinces of Canada, more than half a hundred persons lost their lives during the winter season just closed. Although this figure does not exceed that of past years, the list of accidents of the past winter is remarkable for the large number of double fatalities. In eight cases two persons met their deaths through the ice at the same time, in still another accident four children were drowned and a fifth barely saved.

The number of persons losing their lives in southern New England is larger than usual this year, owing to the mild weather and poor ice.

Of the fifty deaths reported, 23 were those of children fifteen years of age or under.
