

MR. MCNICOL COMING;  
MATTERS TO BE SETTLED

General Manager D. McNicol was  
expected on the Montreal Express to-  
day. However, it is learned that he  
was detained in Montreal. During his  
visit here Mr. McNicol will consult  
with Superintendent Downie on mat-  
ters in connection with the road. A  
question which will receive his atten-  
tion is the move to change the divi-  
sional point of the railway from Wood-  
stock to Aroostook Junction. The  
Woodstock Board of Trade are averse  
to the change and will seek to have  
their town continued as the divisional  
point.

The site for the new C. P. R. sta-  
tion at Bristol will also be considered  
by the general manager. It is con-  
templated to erect a first class station,  
to replace the former building, destroyed  
by fire.

ENDORSE PRINCIPLE OF  
A GROSS INCOME TAX

The sub-committee of the Common  
Council appointed recently to confer  
with the representatives of the street  
railway in the working out of a sys-  
tem of assessment, yesterday after-  
noon endorsed the principle of a gross  
income tax. The findings of the com-  
mittee will be forwarded to the treas-  
ury board and subsequently to the  
Common Council for final action.

A rate of 25 per cent. on the gross  
earnings of the company was fixed as  
the tax to be exacted. While that in  
its application will realize little more  
at present than the system now in  
vogue, it is held that with the earn-  
ings of the company continuing to in-  
crease at their present rate of \$2,500  
per year, some one hundred thousand  
dollars will be added to the yearly  
revenue of the city within a period of  
five years.

The committee further expressed its  
approval of the company's request to  
be empowered to take over the fran-  
chise of the Carleton Light and Pow-  
er Company and will embody a recom-  
mendation covering this in the report  
to be submitted.

Ald. Scully suggested that the com-  
pany institute a workmen's fare.  
Nothing was done in the matter.

It was decided to make the agree-  
ment for a period of nine months at  
the expiration of which the present  
street cleaning agreement would also  
go out of effect.

MILITARY INSPECTION  
HELD AT FREDERICTON

Colonel G. Rolt White, D. O. C., and  
Lieut. Col. G. Hunter Ogilvie, reached  
the city from Fredericton on the Mon-  
treal Express today. At the request of  
the military inspection was held. Among  
the officers present besides the local  
men were: Brigadier General L. W.  
McNicol, commanding the Maritime Provinces;  
Lieut. Col. Wadmore, commanding the  
Royal Canadian Regiment with head-  
quarters at Halifax. Yesterday morn-  
ing the officers inspected H. Company,  
R. C. R., on parade. Later in the day  
they inspected the military hospital,  
gymnasium and the officers' and men's  
quarters were inspected.

The officers were informed The Star  
that the trip had proven a most satis-  
factory one. The visiting officers all ex-  
pressed themselves as well pleased  
with the conditions at Fredericton and  
with the appearance of the company  
and depot generally.

When asked concerning the plans for  
Camp Sussex, Colonel White declared  
it was as yet premature to make any  
definite announcement.

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS TO  
HOLD A CHURCH PARADE

For the first time in the history of  
the order in St. John, the Knights of  
Pythias will hold a church parade and  
attend Divine service. This decision  
was lately reached and the details for  
the march are now being completed. It  
is planned to assemble at the hall on  
Germantown street and march in pro-  
cession to the church. Sunday, June 6, is  
the probable day for the parade.

In addition to the officers and mem-  
bers of the Uniform Rank all the sub-  
ordinate lodges K. O. P. will also  
march.

ANOTHER RELAY RACE

The Young Men's Christian Associa-  
tion of Fredericton, have written Wm.  
Gillespie, of the Clippers Club, inviting  
the club to enter a team in the relay  
race in the Arctic Rink on Monday  
evening next.

The race will be for one mile, four  
men constituting a team. The Clippers  
have already completed arrangements  
to play a double header at the capital  
on Victoria Day, and it is altogether  
probable a fast track team will be  
entered in the event. The Victorias,  
of Fredericton, are entering a strong  
quartette and other entries will be  
gladly accepted. Prizes will be given  
to the winners of the race.
