Dr. Geo. F. Melvin will lecture at the museum of the Natural History Society this evening. His subject is "Evolution in the Light of Human History." The lecture is free. The public are invited.

The council of the Board of Trade met this morning at eleven o'clock to discuss the new attachment act which was introduced by Premier Hasted. The bill was approved in its present form and it is probable that a delegation from the board will appear before the house to urge its adoption when the measure comes up.

The I. R. C. police are waging war on the boarding house runners, but in spite of their activity Officer Collins was surprised to find a man soliciting boarders for a Pond street establishment in the train shed this morning. He was summarily ejected.

Mr. Clarence Carrigan of San Francisco, arrived in the city yesterday for the purpose of seeing the city. He is U. S. Vice-consul, succeeding Mr. L. H. Hoke. Mr. Carrigan has been in service in the artillery branch of the United States army, and this is his first position in the consular service.

At a meeting of the Young Men's Association of Trinity church, held in the school house this evening at 8 o'clock, Rev. W. B. Siam, of Moncton will give a talk upon some of his clerical reminiscences which, without doubt, will be very interesting because of Mr. Siam's wide experience in the church's field of work. All men are welcome.

A gentleman who was driving out on the Black River road on Sunday suggests that the evangelistic meetings might be extended to that locality. He complains that a party of young folk were abusing a horse and at the same time endeavoring to break the roads with a heavy roller, and that they were encouraged rather than reprimanded with by the neighbors.

Everything is about ready for the opening of the poultry show to be held in Sutherland's Hall, Union street, on Monday. The association have been hard at work getting the place in order and an excellent show of the poultry in this section of the country will be seen. The poultry will all be in the bins by this evening and tomorrow, when the show opens, and judging commences the exhibition will be well worth seeing. The committee in charge are endeavoring to make this the best show ever held in the city.

Professor R. McGill of Dalhousie College will lecture before the Canadian Club tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, in Keith's assembly room. His subject will be "The Problems of the City" and the mayor and aldermen have been invited as guests. Afternoon tea will be served at the close of the lecture. Professor McGill has just arrived from Quebec and will lecture at Anbura's on Monday evening. He is a most interesting lecturer and a large audience will no doubt hear him tomorrow.

BUSIEST WEEK OF THE WINTER PORT SEASON
Many Steamers are to Arrive and Sail

Passenger Traffic is Picking Up, and Freight Shipments are Very Heavy.

Steamship companies look forward to a busy week in winter port circles. C. P. R. steamer Empress of Ireland will make her first trip from this port on Friday for Liverpool. The steamer will carry a very large general cargo. Already 50 first, 75 second and 200 third class passengers have been booked.

C. P. R. steamer Lake Maniloba, from Antwerp, will reach port this evening. The steamer will dock at Sand Point tomorrow morning.

Manchester Line steamer Manchester Importer will sail this evening for Manchester. This steamer is taking away heavy shipments of grain, lumber and provisions.

Allan Line (Sardinian, which now lies at No. 4 berth will sail on Thursday for London via Halifax and Harve. As the steamer was delayed in reaching port an extra crew is assisting in loading her cargo.

The Allan Line officials say that the steamer will carry a very heavy cargo. In addition to grain and lumber local merchants are arranging to make other shipments.

Allan Line Granplan will sail from St. John on Friday on her last voyage to Liverpool. The steamer will carry a large number of passengers, including over one hundred naval officers and men, who are returning to England after two years at Esquimaut.

C. P. R. steamer Mount Temple from London via Antwerp will reach port on Thursday. The steamer is bringing a large general cargo. The Montclair also carries a number of passengers.

Allan Line Corsican sailed from Liverpool on Friday last with 1068 passengers for this port. The steamer should reach port on Saturday. There are twenty-six first class, two hundred and sixty-second and seven hundred and eighty-one third class passengers on board. The boat is now equipped with the wireless telegraph service.

Allan Line Heperian will sail from Liverpool on Thursday on her last trip of the season to this port. The steamer will carry several hundred passengers.

Steamship business at St. John is undoubtedly on the increase. The present week is the heaviest during the winter season.

YOUNG NICKERSON GETS EIGHTEEN MONTHS

John Nickerson, the small boy arrested recently with two others for stealing ten dollars from A.
