SMUGGLER'S TRICKS.
 Many Clever and Ingenious Devices For
 Hiding Goods.
 (Chambers's Journal.)
 Smuggling effectively is one of those
 fine arts that have decayed, at least
 in England, where, as we have duties
 on little else than tobacco, the
 spirits, and where we have a seaboard
 closely watched, it cannot be carried
 off to any extent successfully.
 Now and then the revenue men are
 outwitted, but rarely on a large scale,
 and never can a contraband trade be
 carried on for long undetected. It is
 while to apply their minds to the over-
 reaching of the coast guard, and con-
 sequently the art is in its dotage and
 decay.
 Attempts are made occasionally to
 outwit the preventive officers, as when
 a vessel came into the Colne some years
 ago with its cargo of twisted tobacco,
 but it was found out. Oil cans are
 made, or were made, with an interior
 consisting of an inverted funnel of tin.
 When the officers put a stick through
 the neck and turn it about they draw
 it out and find that the never has been

 the can contain smuggled spirits.

**HUSBAND FOUND
 WIFE MURDERED.**

Trenton Man Who Was Insane Did
 the Deed, Then Gave Himself Up.

DETROIT, May 16.—Walking up to
 Patrolman Dacey, on the street here
 today, Frank Lesner, aged 38, a native
 of Trenton, told him that he had mur-
 dered his godmother, Mrs. Michael
 Hammerick, in her home at Trenton
 last night, and inquired the way to
 the station, where he could take a
 train back to his work in the dairy at
 the asylum for criminal insane at
 Ionia, Lesner, who is evidently men-
 tally irresponsible, told the officer that
 Mrs. Hamnerick had bewitched him
 and his whole family, and for that
 reason he had come from Ionia for the
 express purpose of killing her.
 Mrs. Hamnerick was found dead in
 bed by her husband last evening, when
 he returned to their home in Trenton
 from a neighbor's. There were five
 bullet wounds in her body, and her
 search was crushed by a blow from a
 chair.

Halifax People Think It Was Buried
 on MacNab's Island.

It is believed by some that there is
 treasure buried on MacNab's Island.
 Last summer a number of men from a
 schooner spent some days digging
 around MacNab's Cove, but so far as
 known found nothing to reward their
 search.
 Last week a military man was pho-
 tographing the locality and one pic-
 ture showed markings on a stone in-
 cluded in the view. The stone was
 carefully examined, and the markings
 found to be as follows:
 A. B. 2. 1.
 17. 11.
 The stone is south of MacNab's
 Cove and off the light and is in a line
 with Thrup Cap. Nearby has been
 found another marking of three lines
 pointing in different directions, but
 converging at one point.
 Men who have seen the markings
 think the lines and letters and figures
 taken together in some way indicate
 the point at which Capt. Kidd's or
 somebody else's treasure lies waiting
 to reward the digger.

**GOVERNMENT DENOUNCED
 BY TEMPERANCE PEOPLE.**

**Report Presented in Newcastle Urges All
 Temperance Workers to Unite in Over-
 throwing Party in Power.**

NEWCASTLE STATION, N. B., May
 17.—The semi-annual session of the
 Grand Division, S. of T., convened this
 evening, Grand Worthy Patriarch H.
 C. Tilley in the chair. Other officers
 present were Grand Scribe E. A. Ever-
 ett, G. Sentinel D. C. Fisher, G. Super-
 intendent Young People's Work Thos.
 A. Clark, Delegates James Falconer,
 Jas. Ingram, Miss Dunnet, D. Mc-
 Gruber, Charles Johnston, Miss Addie
 Crocker, Edward Falconer, J. E. Rob-
 ertson; Newcastle, Henry Harvey
 Stuart; Harcourt, J. E. Irvine, Black-
 nay; Grandville, Mrs. Dora Grey, Miss
 Annie Morrison, R. H. Young; Fred
 Phillips; Douglastown, R. A. Weeks;
 Derby, H. Morrison, Mrs. William Mor-
 rison, Burnt Church.

The grand scribe reported on tem-
 perance legislation. Last year a com-
 mittee of temperance men headed by
 Rev. C. W. Hamilton, then G. W. pa-
 triarch of the order, approached the
 provincial government asking for
 the repeal of the liquor license law.
 He had asked for provincial prohibition.
 This they absolutely refused to grant.
 If they could not see their way clear
 to grant us provincial prohibition we
 must endeavor to get placed in power
 a provincial government prepared to
 meet our wishes. This can only be
 done by the united efforts of all
 temperance men. We are powerful
 enough to replace the present
 government with one favorable
 to prohibition if we will only use
 our strength. Steps should at once be
 taken by the temperance men in this
 province to get a strong political tem-
 perance organization together. They
 should be organized into a party, and
 good strong foundation for such an
 association, and then this association
 should be prepared to take independent
 action along temperance lines. It is a
 remarkable fact that today neither of
 the two parties in provincial politics
 has adopted a distinctive name. It is
 time that men should vote for one side
 or the other, according to the opinions
 they hold on certain with reference
 to the ability and honesty of government
 and opposition; but the want of dis-
 tinctive names for the two sides in
 provincial politics is a very significant
 fact of want of any distinctive prin-
 ciple around which they rally. The time
 is therefore particularly opportune for
 the temperance people to unite to-
 gether and to take independent steps
 to organize prohibition sentiment in the
 province into political action.
 Thomas Clarke reported five Bands
 of Hope and Loyal Crusaders with 346
 members, a gain of 41 since last
 quarter.

The report of the grand worthy pa-
 triarch, H. C. Tilley, was as follows:
 Officers and Brethren. — Fifty-five
 years ago the 8th day of January, 1850,
 the Grand Division, No. 45, received its
 charter with a membership of 100.
 G. W. P., who officiated at the insti-
 tution of this division was my late
 lamented father, S. L. Tilley. Over
 2500 have since been added to the ranks
 and I am thankful to say that the
 sons of that father are today workers
 in the temperance ranks, one has pas-
 sed through the G. W. P.'s chair, and
 the other now occupies it.
 In looking over the quarterly jour-
 nals of the G. D. a few days ago I
 came across a most interesting report
 of the session held in Fredericton on
 Jan. 29th, 1899, by the then G. W. P.,
 S. L. Tilley. The report dealt with
 the state of the order at that time in
 New Brunswick, and showed that it
 was in a decidedly healthy condition.
 The secret of this satisfactory state of
 the order, I attribute to the many per-
 sists of the G. W. P. of that day
 paid to the many divisions throughout
 the province. His states: "I have
 personally visited nearly half of
 the divisions under my jurisdiction
 since the last session of the Grand Di-
 vision, I feel particularly desirous to
 become personally acquainted with the
 members of our order throughout the
 province. I purpose visiting the di-
 visions in the counties of Albert,
 Westmorland, Kent and Gloucester
 during the ensuing month."
 I only wish I could report to the
 brethren the same amount of work.
 Since my appointment as G. W. P. in
 October last, I have with the grand
 scribe, Mr. Everett, made a number
 of visits in the interest of the cause.
 On Dec. 1st, 1904, the Grand Scribe and
 myself visited Point du Bute in West-
 morland Co., and reorganized Division
 No. 50. The grand chaplain, Rev. Mr.
 Fleming, is W. P. of this division,
 which warrants its success. Brother
 Fleming and Brother Trueman
 treated the G. S. and myself with
 marked kindness and hospitality. The
 next day we were driven by Mr. Flem-
 ington to Sackville, across those bleak
 Dartmouth Marshes, and were em-
 phatically welcomed by Mr. Bell, who
 when we arrived safely at the hospita-
 ble home of Rev. George Fleming.
 In the afternoon Bro. Everett, Stee-
 lington and myself paid a visit to Bro.
 Robert Bell, a veteran temperance
 worker of 85 years of age, who at one
 time filled the position of W. P. of this
 province. I will remember the pleas-
 ure that we had with him very much.
 This faithful brother will be seen
 no more on the floors of the grand
 division, for the Great Patriarch has
 taken his servant from earth to a
 higher world above. Mr. Bell was a

**THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT EN-
 ACTMENT RE THE CIGARETTE.**

The British parliament at its last
 session passed a "Juvenile Smoking
 Prohibition Act," of which the follow-
 ing clauses are the most important:
 "All persons under sixteen are for-
 bidden to smoke of any tobacco in
 any form, under penalty of a fine not
 exceeding two dollars and fifty cents.
 Any dealer who supplies tobacco in any
 form to a person under sixteen is liable
 to a fine not exceeding five dollars for
 the first offence or ten dollars for the
 second. The penalty for third offence
 is the deprivation of license for five
 years."
 The English people are awaiting to
 see that a nation's youth becomes
 its strength or its weakness. If its
 youth is impoverished by the use of
 poison, its strength is clipped, morally
 and physically. In this act Eng-
 land has taken a wise step to protect
 her youth. We trust the day is not
 far distant when Canada will follow
 this step taken by the Mother Country.

**SIR FREDERICK TREVES ON AL-
 COHOL.**

The recent utterances on alcohol, by
 the above named authority have called
 forth much thoughtful comment, and
 a testimony to their truthfulness from
 other men of note. The great
 army of "wreck along the shores of tem-
 perance" have for ages been sorrowfully
 reiterating this fact, "Alcohol is a
 poison." But the words of one live
 man of note seem to have a greater
 power to arrest thought. We would
 like to quote the following from the
 Montreal Daily Star, which presents a
 reasonable view of the matter.—Ed.

A definite statement by a physician,
 with the authority of Sir Frederick
 Treves that alcohol is a poison, and
 that it does not do good, is a most
 helpful thing for the human body
 with which popular opinion credits it,
 is bound to, at least, challenge the con-
 viction of many that they are the
 better for it. Of course, if we are
 still take it for the pleasure it gives
 them, putting aside the idea that they
 must pay for their pleasure in physical
 deterioration, but the drink evil will
 not be very far from widespread
 evil if the ordinary man is convinced
 that it amounts to a drugging of his
 system.
 We make a difference in our minds
 between the pleasures to be gained
 through the use of drugs, such as mor-
 phine or opium, and the exaltation
 that comes from liquor. We are agreed
 that the latter is a fool who plays with
 the deadly drug, and who is not
 half in doubt whether the man who
 drinks liquor in moderation may not
 really get more health than weakness
 out of it. For the man who risks be-
 coming a morphia fiend, we have no
 coming to tempt or pity. For the
 man who toys with alcoholic liquors,
 we have no such superior feeling.
 Yet it is a fact that it is illegal for the
 commission to grant a license to a
 vendor whose license has expired, has
 perhaps a little more value from a temperance
 point of view than the license with re-
 ference to abolition of beer licenses,
 which the committee of the council ex-
 pressed approval, was not to be
 found in the government bill. Of the
 eight sections suggested by us and of
 which the committee has accepted, we
