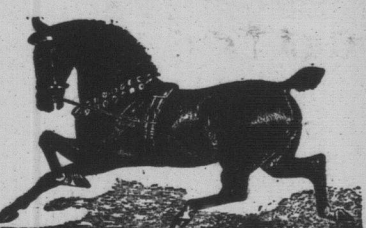

**Etiquette for a Small Home
Wedding**

For a girl who has few friends, or
a limited income a home wedding is
prettier than a church ceremony.
Incidentally much money is needed
to make the latter successful—
artistically—unless the building is
full of guests. While, on the contrary
a home service may be cheery and
picturesque, without a large expendi-
ture.

If the room in which the ceremony
is to be performed is a long one, it
should be so arranged that the couple
may stand at one end. If the room
is square, a better effect is gained by
using one corner.

In order that a special place shall
be defined for the bride and bride-
groom, one or two large palms are
necessary. The plant's height gives
a nucleus about which to build; a
partition as it were. Near the palms
a rug just large enough for the clergy-
man and wedding couple to stand on,
must be laid cater-cornered to the
room. It must not be jammed
against the wall, for space must be
left for the minister. Either at the
back edge of the rug, or in the centre
must be arranged something on which
the couple can kneel during a part of
the service. When this is put down,
a white fur rug laid over it is effective
and most practical.

A few flowers should be put about
the room in vases and jars, but when
money is an object it may be re-
membered that a few blossoms
frequently are quite as pretty as many.

At a home wedding, unless it be a
large one, the bride rarely has more
than one attendant, and it is not
necessary that she shall have any.
A best man is rather necessary for
the bridegroom for the former is use-
ful as well as ornamental. That is a
matter, however, for the individuals
to decide.

At such a small wedding congratula-
tions immediately follow the ceremony
it being taken for granted that the
guests will permit the mother and
father to be the first to greet their
daughter. The bride then talks to
her friends.

Any refreshments served are in-
formally arranged in the dining room,
and, after they have eaten, the guests
are expected to leave, except those
who have been specially asked to stay
to see the bride's departure.

Agonies of Authors' Wives

The domestic life of many famous
authors of the past points to the fact that
married happiness and literary work do
not always go hand in hand. Jane
Welch, for instance, who married Carlyle
scarcely knew the meaning of "matrimon-
ial felicity." Her heart had been given
before her marriage to Edward Irving;
but the gifted orator was engaged to a
Miss Martin and was held to his vow.
Jane Welch therefore married Carlyle,
and three lives were thus irreparably in-
jured. And when the famous author
lived the life of a recluse for six years in
Rochester, his wife confessed that to
her it was the "bitterness of death." In
fact, the hardships of those six years
permanently injured her health, and her
misery was further increased by reason
of Carlyle's irritability and bad temper.

THE BYRON HIL-UNION

One of the most unfortunate unions
in the annals of literature was that of Lord
Byron, who married Miss Millbank, only
daughter and heiress of Sir Ralph Mil-
bank, a wealthy baronet. They lived to-
gether just twelve months, and then
after the birth of a child, Lady Byron
visited her father and refused to return
to her husband. Next month a formal
deed of separation was signed. The true
causes will never be known, although it
is certain that there was extreme incom-
patibility of temper with distressing
waywardness and violence on his side,
and on her side a hopeless inability, or
rather a haughty and perverse disinclina-
tion, to understand or sympathize with
him.

Alexandre Dumas made an unhappy
union, too, with Ida Ferrier, an actress,
while Charles Dickens and his wife
agreed to live apart some years after
their marriage.

MEET AT A BALL

In 1811 Walter Savage Landor met a
young lady at a ball, and, with his usual
impetuosity, determined then and there
to marry her. What is more, he did so.
It is not surprising that the pair lived an
unhappy life, and there were constant
bickerings and temporary separations.

Shelley's affairs of the heart were al-
most too well known to need special
mention. He married the sister of a
school-fellow without being really in
love. He separated from his wife and
ultimately married a second time, after
his first wife had committed suicide by
drowning herself in the Serpentine in
Hyde Park.

And talking of the affairs of the heart
of Shelley, it might be mentioned that
perhaps the only pure and sincere affec-
tion that ever graced the stormy life of
Byron was his boy love for the beautiful
Mary Chaworth who, curiously enough,
was the daughter of a man who had been
killed in a duel by Byron's grand-uncle.

POE'S CHILD-WIFE

On the other hand, of course, the lives
of famous authors of the past contain
some beautiful stories of domestic felicity.
Perhaps the most notable is that of
Robert Browning, who, sixty-two years
ago, married Elizabeth Barrett, perhaps
the greatest poetess the world has ever
seen. The frail health of Mrs. Brown-
ing necessitated residence abroad, and
they settled at Florence where for fifteen
years they lived in perfect and happy
union. Browning herself tended her
frail health with untiring and loving
care.

There does not seem to be much doubt
either, that the death of his wife led
Poe to indulge in excesses which he other-
wise might not have done, although
Mrs. Poe ended her life in misery and
chagrin.

Poe married his cousin, Virginia Clem
in 1835, when he was twenty-six and she
but fourteen years of age. She was a girl
of matchless beauty and loveliness, and,
according to one biographer, possessed a
temper and disposition of surpassing
sweetness. Poe was passionately devoted
to her, but he could not rid himself of
the drink demon, and ultimately his
child-wife died twelve years after the
marriage.
