MELTING POT IS NOW BIGGER THAN AMERICA

U. S. Fighting in Peace Questions Europe is Fighting Out in War, Pres. Wilson Says.

Charlotte, S. C., May 20.—President Wilson today addressed a crowd estimated at more than 10,000, gathered here for the one hundred and forty-first anniversary of the signing of the Mecklenburg declaration of independence. He was introduced by Governor Hiale of North Carolina, who spoke of the President as one of the greatest leaders the nation had ever seen.

The President spoke only briefly and devoted himself almost wholly to discussion of the ideals of the United States. He declared "unholy Americanism" was needed, and that the United States must preserve its ideals in order to be of assistance in helping the world. He was enthusiastically applauded.

The President spoke of the European war. "What are the elements of this war?" he asked. "It is a clash of different elements. Europe is fighting out in war the questions we are fighting in peace. As the processes of communication have grown better, nations and peoples have grown closer together. Men can now learn more about each other. So that now the melting pot is bigger than America. It is as big as the world. See then what a new world we have come into."

"Here in America we have tried to set the example of peace by keeping together. Isn't it the sign and dawn of a new age, that the one thing now on which the world is about to fall back to the normal judgment of mankind?"

The President said he would like to think the "spirit of this occasion" could be expressed "if we could imagine ourselves lifting up some symbol of humanity."

TEN YEARS IMPRISONMENT FOR LYNCH

Death Sentence of American Implicated in the Irish Rebellion has been Commuted

London, May 20.—J. Lynch, the naturalized American, of New York, convicted in connection with the Irish revolt, was sentenced to ten years imprisonment. This report was made to Ambassador Page this afternoon by American Consul Adams in Dublin.

Cable dispatches had reported that Lynch was sentenced to be shot, and that the execution was to take place Wednesday at 4 a. m. Yesterday the war office announced Gen. Maxwell had been asked that sentence be not imposed.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of land in each of the Territories, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made if a suitable house is situated on the land, and the homesteader is a resident of the district.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead, or on a farm of at least 50 acres, on certain conditions. A suitable house is required on the land where residence is substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Pre-emption parties may be obtained as soon as homesteaded parties are certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in the same district. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years on the 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.
