A BIG DEMAND FOR BONDS OF ST. JOHN CO. SCHOOL BOYS ASSIST AT FARMING

Offer Received at 97 in Anticipation of An Early Issue
—Delegates to the Production Conference Today.

In anticipation of an early issue of bonds of the municipality of the city and county of St. John there has been a big demand within the past week from those desiring to purchase County Secretary J. King Kelley, K. C., in reply to an inquiry from The Standard yesterday said that the offer which had been received was ninety-seven for fifteen years five per cent bonds. This figure is considered an excellent one, particularly at the present time, and shows that investors consider the county debentures as an attractive investment. Mr. Kelley said further, in reply to an inquiry, that he did not know how soon another issue of debentures would be made. Of course this will depend entirely on the permanent work to be undertaken by the board.

The city and county of St. John will likely send representatives to the conference at Fredericton today when the matter of increased production will occupy the attention of leading citizens from various sections of the province.

COMPULSORY RATIONING RESTS WITH PUBLIC

Baron Davenport Announces That Organization for Complete Rationing of United Kingdom Cannot Be Completed Before July.

London, May 3.—Baron Davenport, the food controller, announces that an organization for complete rationing of the United Kingdom cannot be completed until the middle of July. The necessity for putting the machinery into motion will not arise if the people loyally observe the King's exhortation to reduce the consumption of bread by one-fourth. In the next eight weeks, the announcement says, the public can decide for itself whether compulsory rationing will be instituted.

TURKEY NOW WANTS PEACE

Amsterdam, via London, May 3.—A Vienna despatch quotes Talaat Bey, Turkish vicer, as saying to a reporter for the Neue Freie Presse that Turkey did not seek conquest, but an honorable peace and had so informed President Wilson. The Turkish premier is quoted as saying: "Turkey went into the war for the defence of the country and with schemes of conquest. We wish an honorable peace, always have wished it and so informed President Wilson. Our enemies refused the invitation, but as soon as they change their minds we are ready to negotiate an honorable peace."

High School Pupils to Be Big Factor in Increased Production—Their Services to Be Recommended.

Today a convention will be held at Fredericton to discuss the subject of increased production of foodstuffs. The province is beginning to realize the necessity of the cultivation of every piece of available land on which foodstuffs can be raised.

In order to cope with the shortage of farm labor it is possible that the High School boys throughout the province will be permitted to leave school a month earlier to assist the farmers in New Brunswick. Although nothing definite has yet been decided, it is understood that this recommendation will be brought up at Fredericton today.

To ascertain the attitude of the boys on the matter W. J. S. Myles, principal of the St. John High School, asked the pupils of the higher grades yesterday how many of them would care to spend their holidays on the farm. Over half of the boys expressed themselves as willing to assist in raising larger crops for the coming season.

Dr. H. S. Bridges will be in attendance at the convention today and the information received yesterday concerning the attitude of the High School pupils will be of interest to the department of agriculture and the director of national service, L. P. D. Tilley.

In western Canada not only the boys, but the girls as well, are to assist in the production of foodstuffs. And provision has been made where by a pupil leaving school for this work will be granted the full term. Besides the consent of the pupils, several other details will be gone into should the proposition meet with the approval of the authorities, such as remuneration, duration of services, etc. The school children have been instructed upon the subject of gardening in the city, but this is considered a force where the very life of the nation is at stake. It is likely that the children of the lower grades will be requested to attend to the gardening while the work of supplying the country with produce will be left to the older pupils.

PROVINCES TO CARE FOR MEN FROM FRONT

Dominion Government Looking After Incapacitated Soldiers—Misunderstanding Cleared Away.

Special to The Standard
Ottawa, May 3.—There is apparently some misunderstanding as to the responsibility of the Dominion and the provinces to provide for returned soldiers. This confusion has particularly arisen in regard to provision for employment of returned soldiers. On October 18th, 1915, a conference was held at Ottawa between the Federal authorities, Military Hospitals Commission, and the governments of the provinces on the initiation of Sir Robert Borden. This conference decided to divide and define the work of caring for the returned soldiers in order that there would be co-operation and co-ordination so as to prevent overlapping.

Up to Provinces
This conference particularly assigned to the provinces the work of providing for employment for soldiers. The official memorandum issued at the time and agreed to by all present stated: "Each of the provinces of Canada working through its central committee should assume the responsibility of endeavoring to find employment for discharged soldiers who upon their return to Canada, are physically and otherwise fit to assume such employment. All expenditures necessary on undertaking the duty should be borne by the province."




