Bubonic Plague Continues To Spread In Constantinople

Geneva, Dec. 16-The International Red Cross here has received a message from Constantinople stating that the bubonic plague continues to spread alarmingly in the city, especially in the poorer quarters. There have also been cases in the European quarters. The government has placarded the streets, demanding that the people under govern-ment action are forbidden thereon and has ordered the closing of the schools, mosques, cafes, public buildings and the suspension of the tramways.

The mortality is increasing daily. The naval units in the harbor are imperilled.
