

wished to say anything on behalf of the accused.

Mr. Weldon replied that it was not his intention to make any defence at present. He would however state that the charge was of fraudulent removal, and he did not think the evidence sufficient to warrant a commitment. To this it was his intention to make a formal objection as well as one to the jurisdiction of the Court.

The magistrate replied that he did not consider that the assent of Mr. Ruel or of any officer of the Custom House would make the removal of the goods less fraudulent.

Mr. Brown was then committed for trial at the next court.

Mr. Weldon offered as bail the same parties in the same amounts by which Mr. Brown has been bailed since his arrest. These are the accused in \$8000, and Geo. Eaton and Geo. F. Smith in \$4000 each. To this the Magistrate with the assent of Mr. Tuck, consented.

Mr. Eaton not being present, not having been spoken to by Mr. Wm. Kennedy, who was in court, offered to become one of the bail if Mr. Eaton did not come.

The magistrate addressing Mr. Brown in a colloquial style told him he was very sorry this affair had taken place.

Mr. Brown: "So am I—but there was no fraud."

The magistrate said that it seemed to him that if he had been in Mr. Brown's place he would have made a splendid effort to pay the duties rather than have the matter come before the Courts. As it was, it was unpleasant for himself, Mr. Brown, and all parties concerned. He had respect for Mr. Ruel, Mr. Sandall, and the other parties, and was sorry that the affair had come up as it had.

Very little interest appeared on the part of the outside public, the only representatives of which were two unknown individuals, outside the dock rail. They apparently felt little concern and betrayed no emotions.

Mr. Brown was smiling and well pleased throughout.

The Close of a Career of Crime.

Wilhelmina Waltem, known as the "Borgin of the State," a little city on the banks of the Elbe, recently surrendered her life on the scaffold to atone for its iniquity. Her career had been marked by continuous, premeditated cruelty. When at school she knocked out the eye of a companion. Being a woman of great beauty she became a governess to the children of a wealthy man who made her his mistress. Her lover's wife having learned of the affair she young tigress poisoned her. At Hamburg, noon after, her beautiful face attracted many admirers, but becoming reckless the police expelled her from the city, and she went to Brunswick, where an officer of the Dutch army fell in love with her. She poisoned him soon after, and then turned up in Hanover, where she married a merchant named Wachter, and avenged herself upon her parents, who opposed the match, by poisoning them. Wachter's second wife, who was married to a widower named Waltem, with two children, these latter became the victims of her murder on step-mother, and the last crime exposed her. Her antecedents were examined, her other victims examined, and the evidence came in sufficient to fix a death sentence upon her. She had it possible. Throughout her confinement prior to her death she wild boasts in her undergarment no mutilation, and though chained to the wall she undertook to attack a clergyman who visited her with spiritual consolation. Her beautiful hair was cut off before taking her to the scaffold, and she was arrayed in a low black muslin dress, which left the neck exposed. She was then forced to kneel in front of the block before a crowd of witnesses; her head was strapped to it, and with one blow of the executioner's axe it rolled into the bucket.

A Miscellaneous Marquis.

It is well to know the character of a friend pretty thoroughly before making a sacrifice for him, as a Torinese banker now in New York has found out. In 1870, when the troops of King Victor Emmanuel entered Rome, a young American, and in company with his mother, threw a bouquet to a dashing young captain who led the first squadron. He noted the attention, and noticed also that the fair donor was a foreigner. He did not know her name, but he had a feeling that she was a princess of the Princesse de Orléans, wife of Amadeus, who had not then become King of Spain. He sought out the young lady, and found by inquiry that she was rich, which was just what he wanted, he was sure that her mother had an eye to the main chance, and that she must make a good showing for the time if he would succeed, as he represented the relationship to the prospective Queen of Spain as much nearer than it was, and talked about his Princesse de Orléans. The young lady's hand was promised him, but he believed him to have some ready money and a few jewels, which he brought with him to New York, and on the strength of them he became a banker. The banker became a clerk, and when six months had elapsed and he heard nothing about a return of the loan, he recently came on to New York, and the nobleman, smugly enquired on Fifth Avenue, to do his worst, which legally is nothing at all.
