

PREVIOUS STANDING AND MAJORITIES AT DISSOLUTION.

Canada's total exports (Canadian produce) in April, 1923, were valued at \$53,642,251, of which \$25,944,331 went to the United States and \$13. 607,556 to the United Kingdom. This is an increase in the total of more than \$20,000,000 over exports of Canadian produce last April. Imports for consumption during the month of April less were valided at \$12,181,820, compared with \$47,695,454 for the corresponding month a year ago.

Trees to the unmber of 10,000 were distributed among Saskatoon school children by the Parks Officials and Dominion Forestry Branch on the occasion of Arbor Day. Each child received one maple and one ash. Last year only 5,000 trees were distributed.
