After a brief illness of only a few days, Mrs. Keesa Duckworth, widow of Lawrence Duckworth, passed away Sunday, Dec. 24, in Mosa. Deceased was a native of Dorchester. She was in her 87th year and is survived by two daughters and four sons.

Early Sunday morning, Dec. 24, the beautiful brick residence of Duncan McKillop, just west of Eagle, was totally destroyed by fire which is supposed to have started from the chimney. Only a small portion of the contents was saved. The loss will be about \$10,000.

Mrs. D. M. Cameron, wife of former Sheriff Cameron, died at the family home in London on Saturday afternoon after a long illness. Mrs. Cameron was born in Toronto on April 12, 1846, and was the daughter of the late William and Harriett Gooderham, of that city. She married Mr. Cameron in 1876 and moved to Strathroy, where they lived until Mr. Cameron's appointment as sheriff of Middlesex county.

The Ontario Government is preparing legislation for introduction at the next session, the object of which is to make land titles absolute after thirty years. It is proposed to pass a declaratory act conferring titles to properties that have been held continuously for that length of time. This will mean great saving of labor in searching titles, making it unnecessary for lawyers to go back beyond that time.

Canadian Municipal securities total \$7,901,027; Railway and other bonds, debentures and stocks \$13,462,068, and call loans not exceeding 30 days \$48,610,100.

The Profit and Loss Account shows that earnings during the year have permitted of the payment to shareholders of the usual dividends and bonus. After making provision for Dominion Government taxes and the write-off on bank premises, a little over \$100,000 was added to Profit and Loss Account, leaving a balance to be carried forward into the new year of \$1,007,514.

Tragedy Near Newbury

Miss May Everett Throws Herself in Front of Express Train

A distressing affair occurred about a mile west of Newbury on Tuesday night when Miss May Everett, daughter of Richard Everett, who lives on the Hagerty road between Newbury and Wardsville, threw herself in front of the Grand Trunk International Limited express about 10 o'clock, and was instantly killed.

Miss Everett had shown symptoms of mental derangement for some time and was under surveillance by the family. Friday evening she managed to elude their watch and disappeared from the house. Searching parties made effort to locate her and intercept her movements but without success. The conductor of the express reports having felt a jar as if his train had struck something and he signalled the engineer to stop. On going back they found the body, which had been thrown about twenty feet.

Dr. Freese, coroner, of Glencoe, was called and will conduct an inquest at the town hall, Newbury, on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Miss Everett was about 35 years of age and is survived by her father and two sisters—Mrs. J. H. Robinson, whose home is near the scene of the tragedy, and Miss Maud Everett, at home. Up until recently the deceased had always been of a very cheerful and social disposition, and was highly esteemed by a large circle of friends and acquaintances.

TALE OF A MUSKRAT

Thursday morning, when Norman Jamieson, living on the first concession of Aldborough, went to the garage to take out the car he met with one of the greatest surprises of his life. After repeatedly making unsuccessful effort to start the motor, he sought the cause of the trouble. Looking under the car, he was astonished to see the tail of some animal dangling above his head, and still more surprised, on lifting up the hood of the motor, to find a huge muskrat busily making a breakfast off the wiring insulation. The rodent refused to be driven away and put up a vigorous fight. He had to succumb, however, when Jamieson's two brothers appeared on the scene, accompanied by the family dog and two cats. In order to get into the garage the muskrat gnawed a hole four to five inches in diameter in the two-inch plank flooring, and when discovered and destroyed considerable of the insulation and other wiring on the car, and the wires were bitten through in several places.

Muskrets are reported to be unusually numerous this season, and instead of keeping to the marshy places along rivers and small streams as is their custom, they are showing a tendency to forage more on the high land, often going long distances from the water. The Jamieson farm is about a mile from the Thames river. A few days ago J. D. Brown, cabinet-maker, encountered a large muskrat on Main street, south, at 12:30. The animal put up so gallant a fight when attacked that Mr. Brown was constrained to let him have his freedom. No doubt the weather propitious, or will read a sign in this muskrat tale that spells but little frost for the balance of the winter.
