SOFT COAL MINERS READY TO STRIKE

SECRETARY WILSON CALLS CHIEFS OF BOTH SIDES TOGETHER
Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 15.—After
approving and sending on its way
to the 4,000 local unions in the country
the official order calling on all union
bituminous coal miners in the United
States to cease coal production at
midnight, October 31, John L. Lewis,
secretary of the United Mine
Workers of America, left here late
for Washington to attend a conference
called by Secretary of Labor Wilson
with Thomas L. Brewster, president

the coal operators association. Mr.
Lewis will arrive in Washington late
tomorrow.

THE ONLY WAY.
Before leaving the city Mr. Lewis
declared that the only thing could
prevent a strike of the miners on
November 11 would be the reaching
of an agreement between the miners
and operators' representatives before
that date.

The miners' head would make no
predictions as to the result of the
conference in Washington. In the
meantime, he said preparations for
a strike would be continued as if
the conference were not in progress.

Washington, Oct. 15.—Secretary
of Labor Wilson announced, to-night,
that he had assumed jurisdiction
under the law as a mediator in the

by the United Mine Workers of America
for a strike on November 1.

Secretary Wilson said the conference
would be held on Friday.

The official strike call permits local
unions to assign "a sufficient number
of men to remain at work to insure
to insure the proper care and protection

of all mining property, in conformity
with the provision of district agree-
ments." It also urged that fullest
co-operation be given "the operator
to prevent injury to property" and
asserts that "under no circumstances
should this rule be violated or set
aside by local unions."
