Senior Chargers eliminate defending pig skin titlists

Oh, sweet revenge! For the past two years, Bramalea Broncos have proved themselves to be the prickly thorn which stood between Clarkson Chargers and the Peel Secondary School senior B football title.

In two successive championship showdowns, the arch-rivals clashed and it was the Northern Peel school that walked off with the coveted silverware both times.

It won't happen again this fall.

Chargers, who have switched to the triple-option wishbone offense and used the razzle-dazzle system effectively in the past three weeks of league warfare,

eliminated the defending Peel senior B champions from further contention with a 10-3 victory Friday afternoon.

It was one of three senior B games on tap. In others, the surprising Brampton Centennial Bucks — who snapped out of a two-year losing streak at the start of their current campaign — won their fourth straight game, 21-6 against Cawthra Park Panthers.

At Mayfield, the host Mavericks finally found something to shout about when they defeated Central Peel Centurions 14-8.

Pace-setter Kennedy Kougars were sitting out Friday's round. The results, however, still left Kougars in first place with an unblemished 5-0-0 record. Brampton (4-1-0) and Clarkson (3-1-1) occupy the next two spots, both assured of playoff berths, and so is fourth-place Central Peel — thanks to Clarkson's win which put an abrupt end to Bramalea's hopes for another assault on the title.

A 20-yard touchdown by running back Barry Mailloux pulled Clarkson back from a first-half deficit. As usual, Chargers (strictly a second-half team so far this season) were slow off the mark and found themselves behind 3-0 in the early going.

Erindale's Robert Fox, who was removed to hospital by ambulance during the game, did not suffer a serious injury, but was held for observation.

At Glenforest, Kevin Aver romped 90 yards with an interception to pace the Gryphons 19-6 win which upped their season's record to 3-2. The surprising Gryphons also got TD's from signal caller Mark Sluce and from running back Bob Willson.

Ed McMathon's major was the only score for Port Credit.

The fate of the fourth and final playoff spot will hang in balance in the feature game of the final round when Erindale Raiders and Gordon Graydon Hawks — the two teams who have ruled the senior Peel pigskin circuit for the past four years — clash.

The story is simple: coach Ron McBride's defending champion Raiders need a win to make it, while a win or a tie are equally sufficient to put coach Grant McKee's Hawks into the playoffs.

Hawks, playing what McKee called a "solid defensive game" set the stage for the cliffhanger by holding Applewood Axemen to a 7-7 stalemate in an exciting exhibition of controlled violence at Applewood.

The outcome of this closely-contested encounter was in doubt until the final whistle.
