

NUTRIMENT IN FOODS.

Every Article of Diet Contains a Large Percentage of Water.

An interesting side-light upon the nutritive values of different of food is furnished by an editorial in The London Lancet treating of the quantity of water to be found iny well-known articles of human diet. It appears, for example, that the turnip contains over per cent. of water, the cabbage neary the same amount, and the cucum ber and the vegetable marrow about the strawberry contains nearly per cent. of water, the apple 82 per cent. and grapes 80 per cent. Even the various meats used food contain an amount of water far in excess of the amount of constituents. Thus three-fourths of beef and mutton consist of water Lamb contains less water, namely, 64 per cent., pork still less, per cent., and bacon only 22.3 cent It would appear that as the flesh foods increase in the amount of fat the proportion of water, as a rule, diminishes. Coming to birds, the flesh of the fowl and duck contains about 70 per cent. of water, and that of the pigeon 75 per cent. while the flesh of the goose tains only 38 per cent., the last being another example of the fat increasing with a corresponding diminution in the proportion of water. Fishes contain from 40 to 80 per cent of water. The egg, one the most powerful of nutritives, con-

The first experiments were on rich bottom Where they sowed five pecks per acre the yield was thirty-four bushels, and where they put on seven pecks they harvested thirty-seven bushels, a gain of a bushel for each peck of seed. It was repeated the next year on five duplicate plots sowed at each rate. In every case the results were in favor of the seven pecks per acre, it giving enough larger crop to more than repay the extra cost of the seed. Tests have been made on the same farm several years since with varying quantities, with the result that best crops were always obtained when not less than five pecks or more than seven pecks were sown.
