The subject of the assessment of the city is one that should be fully considered. In view of the above, and particularly in view of the drastic changes in the assessment law made at the last sitting of the Legislature, no action should be taken in reference to the assessment until the whole subject is carefully looked into and the advisability considered of appointing assessors or relegating the assessment to a commissioner, as provided for in the Act.
