WAS AFTER ROOSEVELT.

Insane Man Created Scene at the White House

Washington, Oct. 6 .- A hand-to-hand encounter with an armed insane man who was determined to see President Roosevelt occurred in the vestibule of the White House before noon vesterday. The man, who gave his name as Peter Elhiott, and his home as Minneapolis, Minn., was overpowered by the officers on duty at the White House entrance and carried to a police van, which had been summoned. He was placed in the van in the custody of two officers. Seeming to realize then for the first time that he was under arrest, Elliott began a furious struggle with his captors for liberty. He drew a revolver from the right side pocket of his trousers and attempted to shoot Officer James Cissell. The officer grabbed his hand and wrenched the weapon from his grasp. Elliott's struggles were so fierce, however, that the two officers in the cramped quarters of the van were unable to overcome him. Officer Cissell then drew his revolver and fired two shots to attract attention. Two officers of the White House force, who had assisted in carrying Elliott to the van, attracted by the shots, rushed back to the vehicle and assisted in overpowering him. terday.
