INDORE, CENTRAL INDIA.

I have not much to say, because I have not done much, my time having been mostly devoted to Hindi. Just now my medical work takes a good deal of time, because the greater number of my patients have to be visited in their houses. I have treated about forty patients; the greater number of these are subjects of chronic disease, and can only be reported as relieved. One death has occurred. All the other acute cases have either been cured or are progressing favourably at the present time. My patients are of all classes, from the pauper to the princess, and from sweepers to Brahmins. I have very been kindly received wherever I have gone. In some places the people express deep gratitude to God for having sent me to them. The native doctors whom I have met have treated me with the utmost kindness and courtesy. I was called to see a woman in a Brahmin family; I found her very dangerously ill, and thought it necessary to visit her twice a day. So much attention seemed to arouse suspicion as to my motives, and I was rather coldly received; I asked for a consultation; two days after they did call Dr. Gampat In the meantime the patient was steadily improving; this fact, together with Dr. Gampat Sing's very decided approbation of the treatment I had adopted, and some strong advice
