The survey was undertaken by the Public Works Department in connection with the utilization of the St. Croix as a Canadian water port.

In many ways a prominent citizen of St. Andrew's, Mr. Magee was the founder of the Bay Pilot, which he sold to Mr. R. E. Armstrong in 1889, who changed its name to THE BEACON and subsequently to St. Andrew's Beacon.

Clarke, Premier of New Brunswick, was entertained at a banquet in his political friends in the section of the County on Monday evening, Dec. 29th, when a number of guests from other places were present, including T.
