Physical power, rather than social amelioration is the prime end of the present Government. They are well clothed, well: equipped, and particularly well lodged; better barracks I have seen no where. The artillery is exceedingly well appointed; its stock of field pieces is immense, and constantly increasing. The very day of my arrival, every shore was ringing with the first trials of 150 new briss cannon. The Turkish navy contains the first un largest three-deckers in the world; and its strength is at every shost interest reinforced by the launching of some splendid war steamer. But all the vessels are poorly manued; their crews are mode up chiefly of raw conscripts from the country, who hardly know a rudder from a plough-fail.

After all, these efforts of Turkey to get up a martial and swashing outside? remind one of an impotent old dotard creeping into fine armor and strutting under borrowed plumes.
