

**More Prisoners Executed by Germans**

LONDON, Oct. 31.—Nine persons who were convicted on Oct. 26th of espionage in Belgium, were executed yesterday, according to the Amsterdam correspondent of Reuters, who says the information was received from an official communication from Berlin. Ten other people, including three women, were sentenced to penal servitude.

**The Goeben Again**

LONDON, Oct. 31.—The Copenhagen correspondent of Exchange Telegraph Co. sends the following: A private message received in Berlin from Bucharest says that the Turkish warships Breslau, Goeben and Hamidich attacked in the Black Sea a Russian squadron of three battleships, several cruisers and destroyers. The result of the battle is not known.

**Greek Sentiment Strong For Allies**

ATHENS, Oct. 30.—Despatches indicate that King Constantine realizes that the tide is turning towards the Allies, and again it would be no surprise if, despite the threats of the Kaiser, when Roumania marches, Greece will be found fighting on the side of the Allies.

**Reward For Bulgars**

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 31.—A despatch from Sofia says that Emperor William has conferred the decoration of the Iron Cross on Crown Prince Boris of Bulgaria, Prince Cyrille, second son of King Ferdinand, Vaneff Radoslavoff, Bulgarian Premier, and General Jacoff, commander in chief of the Bulgarian forces.

**For Constantinople**

ROME, Oct. 31.—Reports received here from the Balkans, state that special trains have been prepared on the Bulgarian railway to transport German troops through Thrace to Constantinople. A quantity of arms and ammunition have been despatched already, it is said.

**French Senate Condemns Germans**

PARIS, Oct. 31.—The Senate on Saturday, unanimously passed a resolution expressing its profound horror at the assassination of Edith Cavell, the British nurse.

**Big Order For Russian Supplies Placed In Japan**

**Japs at Work.**

TOKIO, Oct. 26.—The output of war munitions for Russia resulting from the recent agreement between Japan and the allies is already showing a great increase.

Russian orders include railroad cars, a large quantity of rails, sleepers, locomotives, guns, rifles, ammunition, boots and general leather equipment and cloth. Steel bars have risen on the Tokio market from \$32.50 per ton to \$67.50.

A contract has been signed between the representatives of a Russian commercial house at Vladivostok and a merchant of Osaka for the supply of munitions of war valued at 17 million yen, or \$8,500,000, the orders to be completed by April or May next.

**Turkey in War Times**

DETROIT, Oct. 28.—"The presence of a vestige of the Armenian race, after what it has endured through centuries of oppression, is one of the miracles of history," declared Dr. James P. McNaughton, a missionary from Turkey, in an address here recently at the National Laymen's Missionary convention. Dr. McNaughton, a Canadian, was imprisoned by Turkish officials, shortly after the Ottoman Empire became involved in the present war, but later was released.

He spoke before the conference on "Turkey in War Times," and had praise for the Turk as well as for the Armenians.


"All Ottoman subjects at the outbreak of the war were called upon to contribute 25 per cent. of all movable possessions, with the exception of household furniture," he said. "From the farmers 25 per cent. of their crops was demanded. Calling to the colors all men of military age left thousands destitute. To-day what is left of this mighty Kingdom is fighting for its life. We cannot but admire the bravery of the armies that are making a supreme effort to guard what remains of the national inheritance."

The constructive missionary work in Asia Minor, home of the Armenians, has almost been wiped out, said Dr. McNaughton. He said that before the war there was 148 stations, with 209 missionaries and 1,310 native helpers in this region and that 158 organized churches were attended by congregations aggregating 60,000 persons. There were 450 colleges and schools attended by nearly 26,000 pupils.

**SAYS COALITION GOVT. WILL COLLAPSE**

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Horatio Bottomley, Liberal member of Parliament, in a speech at Newcastle last night, predicted the immediate collapse of the coalition Government. He said that the Premier for all practical purpose, already had resigned, and would be succeeded by Andrew Bonar Law, but that the new experiment would be no more successful than the coalition, and that before the end of the war "we should have revolution or a national council of business men."



**Roumania favor Allies**

PETROGRAD, Oct. 26.—The "Novoye Vremya" prints an interview with the Roumanian envoy, just arrived in Petrograd on a special mission.

He emphatically states the army and the nation are wholly on the side of the Allies and are convinced Roumania will shortly abandon her neutrality.

"We are almost ready," he said, "and can reckon on an army of 600,000, which can be increased to 1,000,000. As to munitions, our War Office has already adopted appropriate measures."

"In the defiles of the Carpathians an army of 320,000 is concentrated."
