Seven New Jersey Colored Men Have Organized an Investment & Supply Lo.

To Give Afre-Americans a Chance at Office Positions and an Racape From Menial Labor.

New York, Aug. 30.-Articles of incom poration have been filed in the office of the ecretary of state in Trenton by the Capital Investment & Supply Co., of New Jersey. All of the seven incorporators are colored

The articles of incorporation of the company permit the corporation to furnish supplies to families, establish stores, deal in real estate and engage in commercial pursuits. It is further said in the papers that suits. It is further said in the papers that the company will carry on a portion of its business outside of New Jersey and the places where the business is to be conducted are New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, Chicago, Cincinnati, Wilmington, Del., and Richmond and Norfolk, Va, and in such other places in the several states and territories of the United States and in such foreign countries as may be and in such foreign countries as may be

found necessary.

The capital stock was placed at 75,000 shares of the par value of \$1 and the amount paid in at the time of incorporation shares of the par value of grands shares of the par value of man shares of the shares of Jersey City; Dr. Joseph G. Weaver, of Orange. and James W. Freeman, James W. Holmes, Joseph H. E. Scotland, Elisha Weaver and Fred Coskry, of New York. An office of the concern has been established in Newark, N. J., another in Washington and negotiations are pending for carrying the company's operations into Cuba. One of the incorportors outlined the purpose as follows:
