## BIG OUTING FOR THE 24TH

Militia Men Will Likely Spend  
Dominion Day at the  
Lakeside.

Elaborate Preparations now  
Under way to Make it En-  
joyable.

The Soldiers of the 24th Regiment were disappointed that they were not going to take the trip to Thamesville on July 1st. The officers, too, felt keenly the loss of the expected outing, so it was decided to make an effort to take the regiment to the lake on July 1st. Arrangements have not been completed yet, but the prospects for the trip are good. The regiment will go by train to Blenheim, and then march to the lake. Each soldier will be provided with haversack, and water bottle and will carry his own eatables, campaign style.

All the expenses of the soldiers will be paid. A very liberal commissariat has been provided, including 100 pounds of meat. Cooks and waiters will be on hand. One thousand rounds of ball ammunition will be used for target practice. They will be accompanied by the drum and bugle band. They will return to Blenheim in time to catch the excursion train to the Eau.

## FOR PRAYER AND PRAISE

Impressive Service Held Last  
Evening in Holy Trinity  
Church.

24th Kent Regiment and Mem-  
bers of City Council Present  
—The Decorations.

The special service of intercession for the speedy recovery of King Edward, which was held in Holy Trinity Church last evening, was very largely attended. It was given in the nature of a special service, by Christ Church and Holy Trinity.

The 24th Regiment, about 150 strong under the command of Adjutant Mowbray, paraded to the church, headed by the drum and bugle band. The members of the city council with the exception of Ald. Cowan, also attended in a body and occupied the front pews in the centre of the church. Although the Sons of England and the Maccabees, to whom invitations had been sent, did not have time to arrange for a parade, a large number from both orders were present. The church was filled to the doors. The choir also was on hand in full force, and the singing was very hearty.

One touching circumstance in connection with the service, was the decoration of the church as bright as possible to correspond with the happy occasion.

A committee was at work decorating the auditorium with flags when the sad news of the King's serious illness came to Chatham. Their work was therefore necessarily stopped and the service last night was held with the decorations in the unfinished condition, bringing home to the people present the great contrast between the service they were listening to and the one they had anticipated.

The regular evening service was held with appropriate lessons and prayers. Revs. Rural Dean McCosh and T. Beverley Smith both taking part. Each preacher gave short addresses suitable to the occasion.

The service closed with silent prayer and the singing of the National Anthem. The closing organ voluntary was one of Mr. Philp's own compositions and was splendidly rendered.

## CITY FACTORIES

The Industrial committee met last evening to consider proposition and petitions from a number of manufacturing concerns. There were present Chairman Cowan, the Mayor, and Aldermen Fleming, Waddell and Marshall.

One proposition was received from a wire firm who contemplate locating in Chatham. Colby & Co. stock rack manufacturers, applied for free water. A similar petition was received from W. M. Drader, who is about to start a box factory on Queen street. Both these factories will require about 500 gallons a day.

All of the matters that came up will be dealt with by the City Council at their next meeting.

The president of the West Kent Agricultural Society, James Chinnick, was in the city Wednesday for the first time since election day. He was making arrangements for the painting and repairing of the buildings at the Fair Grounds, and also for the purpose of calling a special meeting for Wednesday afternoon next to complete the arrangements.
