"Your Royal Highness will, I dare say, be surprised when I tell you that I remember the day when I was quite an indifferent player. I was determined, however, to be what the world calls a genius, and to be a genius I well knew that I must first be a drudge, for genius and drudgery always go hand in hand. Genius," and Paderewski spoke excitedly, "is threequarters drudgery, that's what genius is. I at one time practiced day after day, year after year, till I became almost insensible to sound-became a machine, as it were. Now, Paderewski is a genius,' says the world. Yes, but Paderewski, your Royal Highness, was a drudge before
