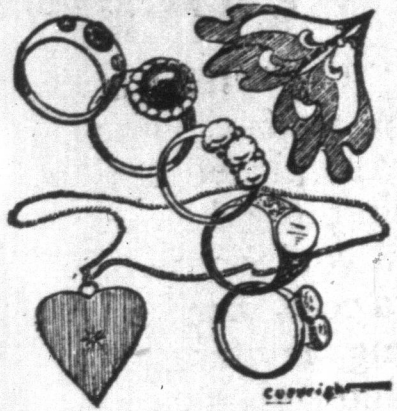

Theatrical

Mr. Samuel Bishop, the principal basso of Exeter Cathedral, England, Mr. Wm. Buckley, an exceptionally clever artist back in piano and organ, and Master Danny Campbell, the famous choir boy soloist, will be heard at the Grand Opera House to-night.

Mr. Samuel Bishop, the principal basso of Exeter Cathedral, England, having received an invitation to visit a few cities in Canada and the United States, in order to give some of his popular recitals succeeded in obtaining from the Cathedral leave of absence for five weeks, sails from Liverpool for Boston by the S. S. Ivernia, September 30, 1902. He immediately engaged Mr. Wm. Buckley, Canada's piano virtuoso and solo organist, to accompany him. Also Master Danny Campbell, the choir boy soloist, who possesses a phenomenally sweet voice, and who has sung with great success, received an invitation for the tour.

Mr. Buckley was greeted with intense enthusiasm."

The Last days of Pompeii at the Grand to-morrow night. Anyone who saw the out-door production of Last Days of Pompeii at Exhibition Park last summer will doubly enjoy John Fay Palmer's dramatic version entitled "Pharaoh," taken from Bulwer's immortal story, "Last Days of Pompeii." The drama follows the language of the book closely, and all the classic characters of importance appear in a play of strong dramatic interest. Christian and Pagan struggles, scenic embellishment and historical ensemble. Nydia, the blind girl, lone the Neapolitan, Glaucus the Athenian, Lytton the gladiator, Julia the rich Roman lady, Apollonides the boy-priest, Saga the witch of Vesuvius, form a kaleidoscope of characters around that strange and mysterious planet of thought which Lord Lytton drew when he created "Pharaoh" the Egyptian. Mr. Palmer's rendition of the character is forcible, and a copy of the character as drawn by the master-mind Bulwer. He has a magnificent physique, and the carriage of Le Grande Monarque, he has given to the American stage an impersonation not to be forgotten. We have nothing but praise for the production in its entirety. It deserves unqualified success, which it seems to have received.—Kansas City Journal.
