THE PENINSULAR FAIR.

"We hope it isn't necessary to use any strong arguments to bring out the citizens of Durham and the residents of the surrounding townships to witness the South Grey Fair, the best of everything brought in the country," was the comment of a Durham newspaper recently, and the same applies to Chatham and the West Kent Agricultural Exhibition. The directors are anxious for success financially as well as in the character of the exhibits. The city is anxious to see a large crowd out, not because the business men expect a record-breaking day for business, but because it shows interest and activity in agricultural pursuits which, after all we may say, do and think, is the mainspring which moves the wheels of progress and the most independent pursuit in which any man can engage.

We believe we are safe in thinking that farmers, as a rule, do not sufficiently appreciate the high and lofty position in which they are engaged as tillers of the soil. If any man is in a position to hold up an independent head it is an honest farmer. The farmers have advantage of us all, but the different lines and callings of life are so co-existent and interdependent that no one class can call himself absolutely independent of the other. September 26th and 27th are the farmers' days in Chatham, and we hope to see them out in large numbers.

SCHOOL DISCIPLINE.

"A Toronto school teacher was hauled before Police Magistrate Denison on the charge of assaulting a pupil. The evidence showed that the lad had refused to obey him and had also refused to hold out his hand for a strapping. In summing up the case the magistrate said:

"I think he got just what he deserved. The trouble is that he thinks his parents will encourage him in his rebellion against the teacher's authority. The case will be dismissed."

"There is altogether too much hanky panky nonsense with reference to reasonable punishment of children. The kid never lived yet for whom a spanking once in a while wasn't beneficial."—*Brantford Courier.*

"The flogging of children in school is repellant to modern ideas," adds the MMail and Empire, "but the judicial and judicious insistence upon discipline and the levying of penalties for breaches of the little laws of the juvenile world are necessary. Parents ought in these matters to be the assistants rather than the police court prosecutors of the teachers. A word of sage advice from home sources will make school life a period in which the child imbibes respect for authority and reverence for law—and this, after all, is the beginning of that branch of worldly wisdom which helps to keep men and women in the right path."

All of which is undoubtedly true in reference to the case in question, but the fact remains the same that more can be accomplished through kindness than harshness. The day for the school strap is past. It has done its duty in the days gone by and it is time that more modern, and less barbarous methods were used in maintaining school discipline. The system of hammering in education may have worked well in the early ages, but the men and women who have undergone this course of study are not anxious to have their children go through the same experience.

To put an end to graft seems to be the chief desire of the East Elgin electors, says the Mail and Empire. And, truth to tell, these citizens could not render a better service to the country than to declare their opposition to the middleman and the "take-off." A good stiff pronouncement against public dishonesty would wake up the Ottawa politicians, and perhaps save us from further losses.

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT, TORONTO

Election of Members of The Advisory Council of Education, 1906.

In accordance with the terms of the Act passed in 1905, entitled "An Act Respecting the Department of Education," consisting an Advisory Council of Education which shall be a consultative committee to confer with the Minister of Education on such subjects as may be submitted to it from time to time, an election will be held in October and November, when representatives of the High School Teachers, Public School Teachers, Separate School Teachers and Public School Inspectors shall be elected for the ensuing three years. There is no regular form of nomination, but all nominations must be made as provided by the following sections of the Act:

"14-1. No teacher or inspector shall be elected to the said Advisory Council who has not been nominated in writing signed by at least six of the persons who are entitled to vote under this Act as a member of the electing body to which such teacher or inspector belongs."

"2. Every nomination paper shall contain the name and post office address of each candidate nominated thereon and the post office address of each person signing such nomination paper, and shall be delivered at the office of the Registrar of the said Advisory Council not later than 1 o'clock in the afternoon on the first Wednesday of October (3rd Oct.) in the year in which the election is to be held and not earlier than two weeks prior to such date (19th Sept.). Nomination papers received by the Registrar by post within the time aforesaid shall be deemed to be duly delivered to him."

"3. Any nomination paper which does not comply with the provisions of this section shall be null and void."

The attention of the Registrars of the following Universities, viz., Toronto, Queen's, McMaster, Ottawa, and Western, is called to the fact that under Section 5 of the Act, the Senators of these Universities are entitled to elect representatives to the Advisory Council of Education.

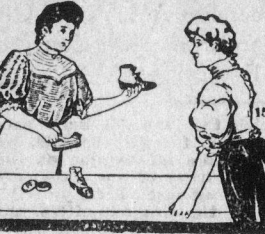

There are held here many "confidential weddings," as they are called when the ceremony is kept unusually quiet. But sometimes they are too confidential to please the relatives of the parties. The coercion of prospective brides under such circumstances is a proceeding well authenticated in fact and fiction. A kidnaped bridegroom, however, is unusual, though he happened at St. George's not long ago. He was a gentleman of position, and he wished to marry a lady who had nursed him through an illness. There was no cause or just impediment save social rank. The gentleman was determined, and the lady seconded his plans admirably. But the day and the details leaked out, and before the time fixed the bridegroom's male relatives deployed strategically through Maddox street and surrounded the church. He drove up in a hansom cab. With his eyes fixed on the expectant bride, he prepared to alight. An athletic uncle and a brother sprang forward, thrust him back, with a "Glad to meet you, old fellow" manner that deceived the cabman, who obeyed the quick direction he heard and drove the three away. The lady, with tears in her eyes, went into the vestry. "There will be no wedding," she said. "They've run away with him." And that was the last St. George's heard of them.

Forests' Unnatural Death.

The life of nearly all forests is cut short by fire or by the hand of the lumberman. When a spruce forest is entirely destroyed by fire, young spruces do not at once spring up and cover the burned area. The seed bearing cones have been burned, and the spores and seeds of other plants which are readily carried by the wind find their way in first. The task of preparing for the forest is begun again, but this time it is to be a shorter one. The first year after the fire mosses and other tiny flowering plants appear. These are replaced by the fireweed and other flowers whose seeds are provided with hairs so that they reach such places quickly. These are soon joined by raspberries, roses and other bushes. Among these the young seedlings of aspens appear in a very few years. The latter grow rapidly and in a score of years form a low sunny forest. An aspen forest makes a brilliant contrast with the dark green forests of spruce.—*St. Nicholas.*

Origin of Ascot Races.

When did Ascot races begin? They are mentioned in the first "Racing Calendar," published in 1727, and the usual statement is that they were founded by the Duke of Cumberland, uncle of George III. But an entry in the accounts of the master of the house in 1712 suggests that they were founded by Queen Anne on Aug. 6, 1711. The truth, no doubt, is that Ascot races, like many other august institutions, gradually developed from a germ, so that it is difficult to say when they really began. At any rate, they were quite the sort of thing that enthusiasts of the turf, Queen Anne, would have founded. She was a thorough Stuart in this passion. It was her great-grandfather, James I., who encouraged, if he did not establish, horse racing in Scotland and popularized it in England.—*London Chronicle.*
