THE LION'S TEETH.

The concurrences of the London press in calling attention to Great Britain's state of naval preparation, and especially to the equipment of 60 battleships with over \$222,000,000 of new 12-inch wire steel guns, is to be taken as a timely showing of his teeth by the British lion. But no disturbance of peace is likely to result from a renewed calling of attention to the fact that Great Britain is more than a match at sea for Russia and Germany together, or, under present circumstances, for Russia, Germany and France together. Let England arm her sixty battleships with the most modern of guns. Let Downing street give the ministry "tip" to the press. Let the cabinets of Europe calculate the chances. And the nearer they bring the possibility of a general assault upon England's tremendous power at sea, backed by the sympathy of that modern Briareus of the hundred arms, the English-speaking world, the more likely they will be to shrink from the attack.

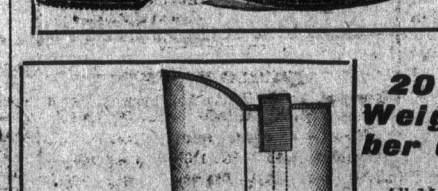
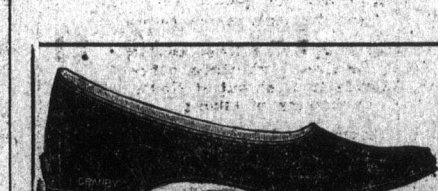
