FUNERAL OF LATE FRANK FITCH

AINSWORTH, B. C., April 15.—Frank Fitch, Ainsworth pioneer, lies tonight high up in the Ainsworth cemetery still deep in the winter snows, overlooking the gorge through which Cedar creek tumbles in perpetual lullaby. His body arrived from Kaslo on yesterday morning's boat, and the funeral which took place yesterday afternoon, was the largest ever held in Ainsworth, the mines shutting down, road work suspending and the stores closing, while Kaslo, Nelson, Crawford Bay, Riondel and Princess Creek were represented in those attending. It was held from Mr. Fitch's late residence, one of the many buildings in the town into which his personal handicraft entered. Rev. M. C. Campbell, Presbyterian minister at Kaslo, conducting the service there and also at the grave.

Two-thirds of the way to the cemetery was through snow, through which a way had to be broken by volunteer workers the previous day. Six Ainsworth old-timers—Henry Steel, Clarence Harman, George McPherson, Lyle McLellan, John Scott and Don Grant—were the pallbearers. A draped wagon served as a hearse, and another bore the flowers to the cemetery. The adult male population of the town was in the cortege.

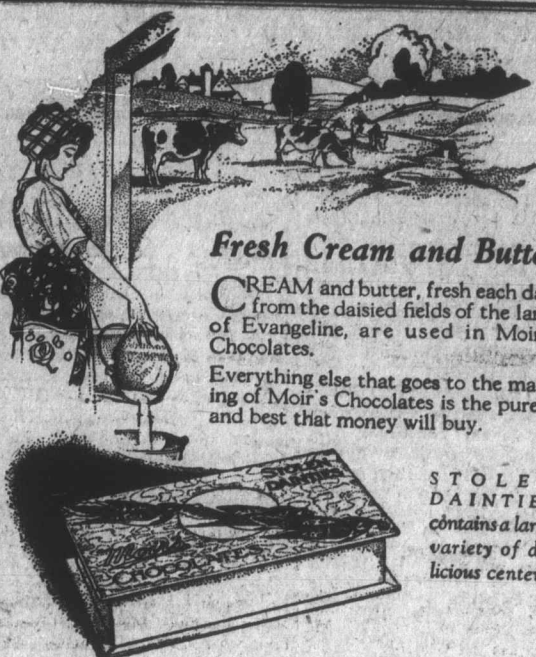
