Curzon is Speed Hog

LONDON, April 30.—(Canadian Press)—Viscount Curzon of Kedleston, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs in the Baldwin Government, is known as "a man who ought to be in jail" and who as he was being expelled for speaking thus, added the taunt "fourteen times convicted" holds him for violations of the speed limit. Since Jack Jones, the West Man Labor M.P. referred to Viscount Curzon's 14 convictions, the noble lord has again been convicted and fined for reckless driving.

In the most recent case against Viscount Curzon, it was stated in court that whereas the speed limit for motor cars was 20 miles an hour his car was going at the rate of 32 miles an hour on the High Road, Chiswick, in the jurisdiction of the Aston Police Court, where the case was heard. Lord Curzon was fined £20 and his driving license was suspended for six months. The defendant's counsel did not dispute the facts. The magistrate, after hearing a list of the convictions against Lord Curzon for breaches of the law by the speed of his cars, said that small fines appeared to be useless to stop him. The magistrate fixed securities against Curzon in the event of an appeal being made against Lord Curzon's conviction, fine and suspension of license.

Ghoulish Traffic in Soldiers' Bones

VERDUN, April 22.—Commercial ghoulies who conducted a hideous traffic in the bones of soldiers who fell in the battle of Verdun, today received a stern warning from the authorities. M. Begu, prefect of the Department of the Meuse, issued a decree forbidding anyone from digging up or trading any kind of bones in the Meuse battlefields.

The inhabitants of the Verdun region are scandalized by the operations of certain people, unearthing bones of animals to sell to factories because they discovered the bones of fallen soldiers were dug up with animal bones and sold by the pound.

Such violent feelings have been aroused against the traffickers that the authorities fear the sellers of heroic "Pillius" bones will be lynched by mobs.

A Unique Plea

WINEPEG, Man., April 30.—(Canadian Press)—The sad and demoralizing effects of too much other were responsible, according to Margaret Ostrowsky—a maid at the Royal Alexandra Hotel—for her thefts from other employees, to which she smilingly pleaded guilty. In her own defence the accused stated she had just come out of the hospital a few days previously, where an operation had been performed on her throat. The medicine which she was using contained a large percentage of ether, and she claimed it had a drugging effect on her senses, so that she did not know what she was doing.

Field For Canadian Products In Brazil

TORONTO, April 21.—Sir Thomas White has just returned from Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, after an absence of ten weeks from Canada. His mission was on business connected with the Brazilian Traction Company, of which he is a director. He visited Rio de Janeiro and San Paulo and went 400 miles into the interior to see the great coffee plantations.

During his absence, Sir Thomas travelled 12,000 miles, and was five weeks at sea, coming and going.

Sir Thomas referred to the opportunities for increased trade between Canada and Brazil if there were direct and regular steamship communication.

Brazil needs machinery, cement, codfish and other products which Canada could supply. The Argentine is a great field for the sale of agricultural implements and Americans are very active in pushing this business. Sir Thomas was doubtful whether the amount of increased trade which might be obtained would warrant the establishment of a regular steamship service from Canada.

Dom. Steel Shareholders Protest Dividend Loss

MONTREAL.—Large holders of Dominion Steel Corporation 6 per cent. preferred stock are preparing to lodge protests with the British Empire Steel Corporation at the suspension of their dividends. Dominion Steel preferred is practically the senior stock in the Besco combination and suspension of its dividends is felt to hurt the company's credit more than suspension of any of the other preferred dividends.

Dominion Steel preferred is secured by deposit of income bonds of the Dominion Coal and of Dominion Iron and Steel, and there it ranks well ahead of other Dominion Iron preferred. Dominion Coal preferred or even Besco preferred. Shareholders feel that the position of the stock was not thoroughly recognized when the corporation dropped all dividends at the same time.
