How Canadians Stole up to Boer Position Before the Dash. Before the Dash.

London, March 3. — The Evening Standard, in its account of the engagements in which the Royal Canadian Regiment participated previous to Gen. Cronie's surrender on Tuesday morning, says: "The Canadians advanced a quarter of a mile in dead silence, then halted, the order being sent along the ranks by each man pressing the hand of his neighbor. They behaved splendidly, and combined steady gallantry with an implicit obedience to orders."
