Take Core of Roads No road can be built that will be permanent, and the speaker declared that it would be far better to build fewer roads and spend more money on the maintenance. He counselled the municipalities to build on PUPILS MINIOTA SCHOOL ly as many roads as they could properly maintain. Up until the present time the building and upkeep of the roads had been left to the farmer, and Mr McGillivray said this is a reason for the non-maintenance of the roads. The farmers had their own work to do, and when good roads and their own work clashed, the good roads were neglected.

The time is coming, he said, when other parties will have to be organized to look after the roads permanently. He further stated that if
