**What is the Temperature  
 About North Pole in July?**

Berlin, Feb. 18.—Just how cold is it  
 at the North Pole? If the tempera-  
 ture is lower than 45 degrees below  
 zero Capt. Roald Amundsen's project-  
 ed attempt to cross it in an airplane  
 is likely to fail, German pilots declare,  
 although that degree of cold would  
 hardly make a Minnesota farmer  
 bring out his earmuffs.

Forty-five degrees below zero,  
 Falkenstein, say veterans German  
 pilots, once stopped the war in one  
 sector when no other elements or  
 earthly agencies could do it, and  
 therefore it is likely to stop Amund-  
 sen.

Early in 1917, they recall, the Ger-  
 mans were striving to regain some  
 trenches in the vast swamps between  
 Mitau and Riga which had been  
 taken by the Russians in a Christmas  
 surprise attack. The operations were  
 constantly being slowed up by the cold  
 until the bitterest day came on Feb.  
 3rd. On that day, despite the intense  
 cold, airplanes started for an attack  
 but were soon forced to land, as the  
 oil froze in the engines. Motor cars,  
 with ammunition, tractors, drawing  
 guns and the hydraulic recoil mechan-  
 ism of the guns all were frozen solid.  
 In the meantime the same thing hap-  
 pened on the Russian side and the

battle, which had been planned to be  
 an intense one, simply froze up.

The pilots believe that the same  
 fate might overtake Amundsen. How-  
 ever, it is the general belief that in  
 July the temperature at the North  
 Pole is somewhat higher than 45  
 degrees below zero.

**PARIS STORMED THE  
 BARGAIN COUNTERS**

French Women Alarmed by the  
 Sudden Fall of the  
 Franc.

Paris, Feb. 14.—Unexpected as it  
 may seem, those most alarmed by the  
 recent sudden fall of the franc were  
 women, especially the dainty Paris-  
 ienne, to whom the wardrobe is the  
 principal consideration in life.  
 Madame and Mademoiselle received  
 beautifully printed catalogues from  
 emporiums, announcing big sales of  
 white goods suitable for making  
 lingerie. The Parisienne enthusiastically  
 made up her budget in anticipation  
 of her purchases, but no sooner  
 had she estimated the number of gar-  
 ments she might have made from a  
 certain quantity of material than the  
 franc began to depreciate at a rapid  
 rate. Mademoiselle's cherished dream  
 of restocking her linen press appeared  
 doomed, for a shrewd business wo-  
 man, she knew that the fine fabrics  
 for sale were imported stuff, probably  
 direct from England, having been pur-  
 chased at a high exchange value. It  
 was easy to figure how prices would  
 proportionately rise.  
 Nevertheless, the women rushed  
 the shops on the opening day of the  
 sales and stormed the bargain coun-  
 ters, marching with their bills to the  
 cash desk. Much to their astonish-  
 ment, the prices had not been in-  
 creased.

**STATUS IS RECOGNIZED.**

Colonial Office List Contains Agents-  
 General.

London, Feb. 16.—The new Colonial  
 Office list to be prepared this year  
 will contain for the first time the  
 names of the agents-general of the  
 Canadian provinces, represented in  
 London. Hitherto, although the Aus-  
 tralian agents-general have been re-  
 cognized by the Crown, those of the  
 Canadian provinces, largely  
 owing to the opposition by Lord  
 Strathcona and some other high com-  
 missioners, have had no status. British  
 Columbia's representative, P. C.  
 Wade, has been pressing for recognition  
 for the last five years, and his  
 efforts have now been crowned  
 with success. This consummation  
 will remove what has been the cause  
 of friction in some past instances  
 between the Dominion and provincial  
 representatives.
