INFLUENZA STRIKES HORSES

The Fredericton Mail says: Owners of horses in and about Fredericton have been greatly inconvenienced lately by a severe outbreak of influenza or shipping fever among their horses. Livery stables have been particularly affected. In some quarters it is believed that a form of the disease much worse than that usually found in New Brunswick was brought here during the winter by horses imported in large numbers from Ontario and Quebec. The name Western influenza is given to the disease by some.

Dr. G. C. McCoy, veterinarian states that the disease is not alarming, although differing in some features from that usually encountered in this province. He states that there always is some of this disease in evidence throughout the country.

The most noticeable symptom of the disease is swelling of the head and legs of the horses. In some cases the legs swell several times their ordinary size. A general illness also accompanies the disease. The horse recovers in two or three weeks.

Wisdom Teeth Test Was Fatal

Gave Austrians Pretext to Hang Two Albanian Children

As a partial explanation of the fact that the masses of the population of Albania, which early in the world war were alleged to have been rather friendly to the Austrian invaders, made the evacuation of the occupying troops of the Central Powers an occasion for displaying extreme hostility to the Austrian soldiers, many of whom were shot from ambush while leaving the country, the Vienna Arbeiter Zeitung of Dec. 18, prints an example of how Austrian military 'justice' functioned in Albania.

It appears that two Albanian boys named Husko and Hairis Kalacs, aged 15 and 18 years, respectively, who had been pro-Austria at the time of the invasion, and had been supplied with weapons by the invaders failed to hear of an Austrian order calling for the immediate delivery of all arms in the possession of the Albanians and consequently were apprehended, tried by court-martial and found guilty, being condemned to death.

"But," says the Arbeiter, "the two were children and it is not permissible to execute children. What did the judges do. They ordered an army doctor to establish the two arrested persons' qualifications for the gallows. The doctor examined the two boys, looked at their teeth, found that their wisdom teeth were visible, and declared that the accused persons must be between 20 and 21 years of age. The two children were then hanged."

The newspaper gives the names of the three judges and the doctor and demands that they, together with the commandant who approved the verdict be arrested.

To Solve Canada's Employment Problem

EVERYONE in Canada should understand just what the Government is doing to solve the unemployment problems that may arise through the demobilization of our fighting forces.

- (1) **Employment Offices.**
So that everyone—male or female, soldier or civilian—can get quickly such jobs as are available the Government is co-operating with the Provinces in establishing a chain of Public Employment Offices. Employers are being urged to make use of these offices to secure any help they need. Farmers, for example, who need hired men should apply to the nearest office. There will be a Public Employment Office in every town of 10,000 people—and wherever the need for one exists. There will be 60 different offices in all—one-half are already in operation.
- (2) **Employment Opportunities.**
The war held up much work that will now be carried on at once. Public works, shipbuilding, roadbuilding, railway work—construction of bridges, improvement of road-bed, making of new equipment—these will provide new opportunities for employment. In addition, the Government has sent a Trade Mission overseas to secure for Canada a share in the business of providing materials and products required for reconstruction work in Europe. It has also set aside the large sum of \$25,000,000 to be loaned through the Provinces to encourage the building of workmen's houses. This will mean much new work in the spring.
- (3) **Land and Loans for Soldiers.**
To help soldiers become farmers the Government has developed a programme that includes the providing of land, the granting of loans, and the training and supervision of those inexperienced in farming. At present, the soldier is granted, free, in addition to his ordinary homestead right, one quarter-section of Dominion lands. He also receives a loan up to the maximum of \$2,500. These original plans are now being broadened. If Parliament passes the new proposals during this session, the Soldier Settlement Board will be able to buy suitable land and re-sell it to the soldier at cost. Land up to the value of \$5,000 may be bought by this plan—the money to be repaid in 20 years. The low interest rate of 5 per cent. will be charged. These new proposals will also permit the Soldier Settlement Board to loan the soldier-farmer up to \$2,500 for purchasing equipment, etc., in addition to \$5,000 loan on his farm.
