




Extracts Can Be Sold Only By Small Bottle

Limit of Two and a Half Ounces per Day per Person-Record of Sales Must be Kept

In pursuance of the announcement nade by Premier Foster to a delegation of wholesale grocers that the provincial Government would make regulations governing the sale of extracts, essences and inctures, the Royal Gazette contains notce of the rules and regulations-

These are made under The Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 and reduce the quantity of extract which may be retailed in any one container to two and one half ounce and provides severe penalities for infraction of any of the rules and regulations. This action is taken on account of the use of extracts for beverage purposes and the recent prosecution of wholesalers at St. John under the Prohibition Act for having xtracts for sale.

It is provided that every manufacturer vholesale merchant or broker before he shall manufacture, compound, purchase, receive, keep for sale or sell any tincture essence or extract of ginger, lemon, vanilla or any other flaoring extract containing alby registered letter at Frederiction of his ntention.

No extracts, essences or tinctures shall be sold except in containers or bottles containing not more than two and one half ounces and all persons selling such must keep a record showing names and addresses of all persons buying, the dates of sales and the quantities of all sales. A true copy of such record must be furnished any Inspector upon demand and the book must be open to inspection by any Inspector.

The regulations however, will not prevent the sale of such extracts in a bottle or container containing more than two and a half ounces, to a druggist or manufacturer of confectionery or similar commodity or to a person in any trade or business in which any such article is commony used for legitimate purposes, or to any public in stitution or to dealers for resale to ary of the persons mentioned in the proviso. Record books for such sales must be kept and every person so selling shall have reasonable ground to believe that such sale is for legitimate purposes.

Preparations containing less than two per cent of proof spirits do not come under the provisions of the rules and regulations.

No peddler or transient trader is per. mitted to sell or dispose of any tincture essence or extract mentioned, no sale for beverage purposes is authorized, no retailer shall sell to any person in one day more than two and one half ounces except s provided.

Any person, firm or corporation, his or its clerk, servant or agent selling for beverage purposes shall be liable under The Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916. Penalty for a first offence is ten dollars fine, for second offence a fine from twenty to forty dollars. In default of either penalty the accused is to go to jail for a period not to

The Right Birds For Laying Contest just after they have reached the Contest, neither before nor weeks after.

Seven pens that were fairly well matured and, in good condition when they arrived averaged 3.5 eggs per bird for the two months ending December 31. The seven pens which arrived in an immature condition averaged 1.3 eggs per bird for the first two months. At the end of six months the younger birds, having them matured, gave an average for the six months of 24.1 eggs. While the well matured first at the end of the six months gave as average for the six months gave as average of 44.2 eggs, or a relative erross revenue for eggs of 566.85 for the immature hirds and \$142.15



for the mature birds.

In some case; birds arrived at the Contests past maturity, that is, they had started to lay before entering he contest and the change brought This. condition however, was not quite so apparent in the Prince Edward Island Contest as in some of the other Contests.

In order to make a good yearly revenue birds must lay during the period of high prices and if they do ot start laying before the cold wea er, comes, as a rule, they will not tart to lay for weeks and sometimes nonths afterwards.

Pen No. 2 did not lay an egg during the first four weeks of the Con est and had only three birds laying t the end of the 8th week with a total production of 29 eggs. Pen No 1 started laying during the fifth week and had only three birds lav ing at the end of the 8th week with a total production of 27 eggs. Pen No. 17 did not start until the 10th week thereby handicapping them selves by over two months and that he two months when prices were high.
