Atlantic Cable Amalgamation.

Latest Details of the New Scheme The activity in the stocks of the Anglo-American Telegraph Company during the past few days is to be atributed to the fact that the negotiatoins for an amalgamation of working interests between the Western Union and the British Companies are in their final stage, and will, the promotors of the scheme hope, be completed during the present visit to London of Ma Theodore Vail, the President of the Western Union Company, who nainly responsible for the policy of amalgamation. A good deal of mystery has hitherto been maintained in since 1906, when the rate was 3% per connexion with the proposed deal, but we have now obtained information from well-informed sources, and Mr. Vail has himself furnished inforjects of the scheme.
